Besides the regular events the managers are working on some accessories, entirely new to the university, which will prove both interesting and instructive. One of these is the throwing of the discus. This is a disc 8 1/2 inches in diameter and 2 inches thick, weighing about 4 1/2 pounds. The one to be used here is made of rubber with a brass band. This was one of the principal events of the ancient Olympia games and in the international contests at Olympia in 1896 was won by the American, Gerrard, who threw it 95 feet 5 inches. The American record was made by Sheldon of Yale in 1896 and is 108 feet 8 inches.

EXPOSITION GUARDS.

The cadets desirous of acting as guards at the trans-Mississippi exposition met in the armory Monday and the chancellor explained to them what would be required. Mr. Llewellyn who will have charge of the guard was to have been present but he sent a letter giving all conditions in detail. The cadets must sign a contract to stay until the first of November and must be on the ground ten days before the exposition opens. The pay, to begin the first of June, is: Captain, \$75; 1st lieutenant, \$65; 2d lieutenant, \$60; sergeants, \$50; corp., \$45; privates, \$40.

The guard is to be formed in one company, the men to be on duty four hours at a time. The men will have to buy uniform and board themselves.

The chancellor stated that the terms were not as favorable as he had expected and few of those present seemed at all satisfied. However, those who wish to go will be drilled by Lieut. Lyons in saber drill and guard duty. About forty men have been examined by Dr. Hastings and most have passed very satisfactorily.
