EDUCATIONAL ATHLETICS.

College Event Slightly Altered by the Calling Out of Regulars.

New Orleans, La., May 13.—At the athletic grounds of the Tulane university will be held tomorrow the most memorable meeting of field and track athletics ever seen in the south. The occasion will be the spring meeting of the Southern Association of the Amateur Athletic Union. The list of contestants is not, however, limited to this section of the country, and among the entries are prominent athletics from many of the northern and western states, New England and the Dominion of Canada.

The attendance will be but little interfered with by the war, and but one feature of the original program has been scratched off. This was the event in which athletes of the regular army were to take part. There will be eighteen events decided, the winners of which will receive medals emblematic of the spring championship. A silver cup will also be presented to the club winning first place in the relay race.
