NOTES OF INTEREST.

Dr. Martin Van Buren Stevens, 21 years old, is a law student at the State University of Kansas. He expects to graduate next spring. He has already received degrees from other colleges.

It is said that the successor of Dr. E. Benjamin Andrews as president of Brown University, will be the Rev. Edward Judson, D. D., pastor of the Judson Memorial church, New York City.

A. F. Montmorency, who graduated from the university in 1894, writes from the city of Mexico to have the promises to remit as soon as he can get some American money. There is no place on the globe to which University men do not go and the Nebraskan of course, must follow.

Mr. L. W. Ewart, secretary of the Oratorical association, has already taken charge of the work and is working hard to secure the prizes that have been offered in past years for this school year. Heretofore the winners of oratorical contests have not always received their prizes in full, but a strong effort is being made to have all the prizes paid this year. There is no better material anywhere for contestants in this field than in our University, and there should be a large number of them enter the contest.

A mass meeting of students and faculty was held in chapel Tuesday, at the chapel hour for the purpose of electing a committee to take charge of the college settlement work. The following were chosen as members of the committee: R. C. Lansing, W. C. Hills, Miss Edith Henry and Miss Edna Polk. Prof. Fossler, the retiring president made a short report of the work.

Dr. Ward, of the department of logic, has been honored by the American Microscopical Society, having been elected its secretary at the meeting held in Syracuse, N. Y., September 1. The other officers were: President, William C. Krauss; Vice President, Prof. A. MacClellan of Columbus; second vice president, Dr. G. C. Huger of Ann Arbor, Mich.; treasurer, Magnus Pease of Pittsburgh; executive committee, Prof. S. H. Gage of Ithaca, Dr. A. Clifford Mercer of Syracuse, and Dr. A. Moore of Ithaca.

The first meeting of the Freshman class was held yesterday afternoon. After much singing and parliamentary practice they voted the following officers: President, Chas. W. Potts; first vice president, Chas. Weiss; second vice president, Miss Jaynes; secretary, Miss Ewing; treasurer, Miss Jackson.

A constitution written by Mr. Hayes and Mrs. Potts was adopted. President Potts appointed Clyde Hayes, Beatrice manager, and Studio Clegg, captain of the freshmen on all teams. S. M. McDonald was chosen freshman in the conference for the Fresh-Sophomore contest. The freshmen started out this year with a large class and promise to make things warm in class affairs.

One of the strongest football teams in the country will be organized in Tonawanda for the benefit of Yale's men, who will go there to train under the famous "Silent Captain," Frank Hinkey. Hinkey will coach and go to New Haven. There are before the Yale players tall war, but he will train thirty-five and fifty applicants for positions on the team to be selected by Hinkey, and Captain Chamberlain of Yale will send some of the candidates for positions on the Yale aggregation to Tonawanda.

Coach Hinkey's principal reason for declining to go to New Haven is the fact that his business will necessitate his presence in Tonawanda. He is the manager and proprietor of a large retail store in that city, and he says that it will be quite impossible for him to leave for any length of time. Hinkey has abandoned the study of law, has quit politics and has settled down to business.

The men sent from New Haven will devote much practice to sprinting and they will be placed in a position on the team that they will occupy on the Yale team. They will get pointers on getting down the field when the ball is snapped, and will get special practice in blocking mass plays.

It is said that Hinkey will throughout the entire season coach the new team to be organized here, and he may give a good deal of his attention to the North Tonawanda High school team which played for the high school championship last year with the Madison, Wis., High school team at Detroit. Some of the best men who will probably get places on the team about to be organized belong to the Third New York Volunteers.

Frank Hinkey, who also played in the Yale eleven, will get a place on the new eleven, which will figure in big match games with the New York and Pennsylvania teams.
