**FOOTBALL SATURDAY.**

The football game next Saturday between our university and Grinnell college on our campus promises to be an interesting one, and from all indications will be the best game of the series of home games.

Grinnell has been working hard and training faithfully. Many of the last year's players are back again and the ability of the team to put up a strong game of football cannot be questioned in the least when we take into consideration the magnificent victory it won over Minneapolis state university a short time ago, the score being 16 to 6.

The Nebraska boys have just returned from their trip to Missouri and are confident of showing the Iowa boys the same that they showed the Missourians.

It will cost more to bring the Grinnell team here than any other team that plays on our home grounds this year, so the student body should turn out in force and help out financially as well as to cheer the boys in gaining another scalp to dangle at their belts.

**WILLIAM JEWELL GAME.**

The Nebraska football players, last year's champions of the Intercollegiate League, bowled over the canvas-backed youngsters from William Jewell yesterday afternoon, defeating them by a score of 38 to 0. The game was played at Exposition park before a handful of spectators, most of them wore the colors of the Baptist college.

The Nebraskans had their opponents cared at the start and their score was nearly twenty when the Missouri youngsters awoke to the fact that they themselves could play a little football. They located a weak spot in the Nebraska line and crashed through repeatedly. Only the overwhelming superiority of weight coupled with the too frequent fumbling prevented a touchdown in that one rally made by the Missourians. The ball was forced to the twenty yard line and there sacrificed.

Three minutes after the commencement of the play the Nebraskans scored their first touchdown, Pillsbury carrying the ball after a fifteen yard run. The leather was again worked to within five yards of the line, when Nebraska fumbled, but secured the ball on a fluke by William Jewell. Kingsbury was forced over for the second score. Benedict rounded right end for thirty yards and then made forty-five around left, planting the ball between the posts twelve minutes after the second touchdown.

Then the Baptists made their rally, which lasted but a few minutes, but which brought to light unmistakable weak spots in the Nebraska line. Repeated gains were made by hitting the line, and Porter, William Jewell's best ground gainer, skirted the Nebraska right end for thirty yards. On the twentieth yard line Nebraska secured the ball on a fumble.

In the second half the William Jewells showed the effect of their hard work in the fore part of the game and offered little resistance to the attacks of their heavier opponents. Two yards from the goal line Folmer fumbled the ball and it rolled across, Carl securing a safety by falling upon it.
