organization will be of a somewhat different nature from the well known walking club. It will be limited in membership, and instead of walking small distances at regular intervals, will walk as frequently-or infrequently-and for as long a distance as the members see fit. During the spring, tramps will be made to the neighboring towns, say from five to ten miles away, where the members can dine at the hotels and take the train back fo Lincoln if they (so wish. A particula) leature of each excursion will be the sumpteous lunch which the quarter-master of the club will take with her in a wheelbarrow. As soon as the club is fully organized, we hope to publish the names of the members and of the officers.

There has been a change in the printing of the catalogue. Hereafter it will be issued in three separate pamphlets. The catalogue proper will contain a list of the taculty and all the other officers, and the names of the students arranged in alphabetical order with the amount of work each one has completed opposite their name. The second pamphlet, of which a few of the advance sheets have been posted on the chancellor's board, will contain a statement of the college courses and of the work of the different departments of instruction. This will be out in a short time. General infor mation and some illustrations will be furnished in a pamphlet to be issued from time to time as the demands upon the officz may require. This plan will enable the university to give the same information with less expense, as not all of the pamphlets will be needed by the same person at the same time.
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
