The following exhaustive constitution of the state athletic association was adopted at the recent constitutional convention held at the state university, and has been ratified by the various local athletic associations:
CONSTBTUTION OF NEBRASKA INTER COLILEGATE ATHLETIC association.

## Approved Saturday, Fune 16, 18qz. artiche 1.

Sect. 1. This organization shall be known as the Nebraska inter-collegiate athletic association. ARTICLE H.
SEC. 1.* The object of this association shall be to develop a more lively interest in athletic sports among the students of the universities and colleges of Nebraska.

## ARTICLE III.

SEC. 1. The association shall consist of the local associations of the following institutions; University of Nebraska, Doane college, Nehraska Wesleyan and Cotner universities, and such other colleges and universities of the state as may by a majority of the local associations be hereafter admitted. ARTICLE IV.
SEC. 1. The officers shall consist of a president, vicepresiden:, secretary, treasurer, and director of sports, all of whom shall ie elected by the state association, and the director of sports shall be chosen from the institution holding the field day exercises.

Sec. 2. The offices of the association shall be held in regular rotation by the different institutions in the following order: president, director of sporis, vice president, secretary, treasurer, to be held in order by University of Nebraska, Cotner, Wesleyan, and Doane.

Sec. 3. Each local association shall be entitled to not more than five (5) delegates to the state association.

SEC. 4. Each delegation shall be entitled to but one (t) vote in the state association.

SEC. 5. The regular meetings of the state association shall be held on the second Friday of March of each year, at such place as is specified by the executive committee. Such committee bas power to call special meetings, at any time or place, provided they forward notices of such meetings to the local associations, one (1) week in advance.

SEe. 6. The term of office shall lie one year, or until a successor is elected.

Sec, 7. Local associations shall supply all vacancies in offices which they are entitled to hold.

## article v.

Ske. 1. The duties of the officers shall be such as usually pertain to their respective offices.

SEC, 2. The executive committee shall have power to transact all husiness when the state association is not in session.

AkTicle Vt.
SEC. 1. The annual field day shall be held at the different associations in the following rotation: University of Nebriska, Cotner university, Wesleyan university, Doane college, new members.

## ARTiclev vil.

Sge. 1. The expense of each firld day shall be met by an assessment on the institutions represented in the state association, proportional to the number of male students in
attendance at each institution, at the time of such assessment, as certified to by the registrar of the institution.

Ske. 2. All surplus arising from assessments, gate receipts, etc., shall be apportioned in the same manner.

SEC. 3. All assessments shall be made by the executive committee consisting of the president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, and director of sports, and shall be levied as in article 7 , section 1 .

SEC. 4. The treasurer shall give bonds to the amount of two hundred and fifty ( $\$ 250$ ) dollars, the same to be approved by the executive committee.

ARTICLE VIIt.
SEC. 1. Professors and professionals are to be excluded from taking part in field day exescises.

SEC. 2. Each institution is limited to two entries in each event but are to be allowed but one entry in the relay race and tug of-war.

Sec. 3. If a contestant be challenged he shall give affidavit as to whether he is a professional.

## article ix.

Sec, 1. All amendments to this constitution to be adopted must receive a three-fourths vote of the state association.
