

II. Division A shall debate on the evening of Wednesday, November 7; B, Thursday, November 8; C, Friday, November 9; and D, Saturday, November 10.

III. Subjects for discussion shall be determined in this manner: Each debater in division A shall select a question approved by five of the members in division A and from these eight questions one shall be chosen by lot as the question which division A shall discuss. The other divisions will proceed to select subjects in like manner.

IV. Sides in the debate shall likewise be determined by lot,—those drawing the odd numbers taking the affirmative, and those drawing the even numbers taking the negative. The debaters shall speak in the order indicated by the lot drawn—that is number one in division A will open, and so on through the evening. A word in explanation of this rule may not be out of place. It does not mean that one debater may not trade with another. He has a right to the place secured, and can do what he pleases with it.

V. Each debater shall be allowed fifteen minutes and no more in which to discuss the question.
