LITERARY NOTES.
Those who welcomed the appearance of Raphael, the initial number of the Riverslde art series, as meeting in an admirable way a very distinct need will be glad to learn that Houghton Miffln \& Co, have just published another volume of this same seriesRembrandt, by Estelle M. Hurll.
The book is equipped with introduc tory matter in the way of chronological tables, blographical sketch and historical directory of the pictures such as was supplled for the Raphael; the body of the book is likewise made up of three or tour pages of simple, inter pretative text for each of the sixteen pletures, and a proaouneing vocabulary of proper names is added.
Miss Hurll tells the story of the ple tures in simple, untechnical form, bringing out the symbolism, if any, and telling the legends pictured by the artist. These pictures are chosen to show the most reprecentative styles of the artist's work, and among them will be found "Jacob Wrestling with the Angel," "Tsrael Blessing the Sons of Joseph," "The Rat Killer" (etching), "The Pbllosopher in Meditation" and others.
Several interesting numbers have been Added to the Riverside literature serles since the baginning of the school year.
"Chaucer's Prologue" (No. 135) and 'The Knight's Tate, and The Nun's Priest's 'Tate" (No. 136), edited by Professor Frank Jewett Mather, Jr, of Williams College. This select on from the "Canterbury Tales," especially edited for the Riverside literaure series, makes a good working book for classes in schools ard colloges, as there is ar equipment consisting of an introduction biograjpical dad critical, separate introtuctions to the tales and the protogue, an appendix of various ieadings, and a glossary. The whole work is done with scholarly care and will repay examination.
Books 1, VI, XXt Aus, XXIV of
"Homer's liad ", liam Cullen Bryant (No. $1: 17$ ), are too well known to need specia! mention here. This number is made more useful for schools by an introduction, notes and a pronouncing vocal-ulary of proper names especiatly prepared for
