We are too prone in athletics, as in other things, to specialize and to make no effort toward our own and general advancement in lines where we cannot excel. Athletic development ought to become a feature of all culture, a part of the furnishing of every well-ordered man and woman. Such a change, moreover, would mean the raising and not the lowering of the plan of intercollegiate contests. These would then become the sign and symwhole student body,"
