members, has held weekly meetings, and been quite active in missionary work. Five joint missionary meetings with the Y. W. C. A. have served to quicken missionary interests. A number of students have placed libraries in their home, Young Peoples Societies. Most of the societies of the city churches have purchased libraries through the influence of university students. This is one of the most practicable lines of work the department has taken up for several years. Between 30 and 40 persons have been registered in the mission study classes for one or more terms. Rev. D. E. Smith conducted the class the first term and Miss Countryman has been leader the last two terms. The first study was on Japan, the second, missionary biographies and the present course is a study of medical missions.

CARE FOR THE SICK.

This work was under the direct supervision of the general secretary, J. S. Moore. This work can not be commended too highly. The association has had a room at its disposal on Thirteenth and T. Special nurses and a physician were employed whenever needed. In many cases it was not necessary to remove the patient to this private hospital. Flowers and cheerful associates were provided in every case of sickness that came to the attention and under the care of the association.

STATE FARM BRANCH.

A branch association consisting of 30 members was organized at the State Farm. One social was held in January which proved to be a great stimulus to the work. Devotional meetings were held on each Friday evening. The work organized at the Farm is promising and meets a need. Too much can not be said of the hearty support given to the work by the faculty of the Farm school.

CONCLUSION. Many details of interest must on necessity be omitted from this report. The plan of hiring a general secretary has by this time commended itself to all, and no one needs to have his attention called to the excellent services Mr. J. S. Moore has rendered in this capacity. The board of directors, composed of two members of the faculty-Drs. Ward and Hastings-and two business men-Dr. Paine and Mr. Oberlies, has wisely counseled and directed the general policy of the organization. Much praise and credit is due to their

assistance in this work.
