**RATES OF TUITION AND BOARD.**

Are very reasonable, and the cheapness of board at Fremont compared with cost in other cities about off-sets the whole price of tuition. Tuition for fifteen weeks is \$15. Instrumental music, \$12 per twenty lessons; voice culture, \$12; fine arts, \$10 per twelve three-hour lessons; short-hand, \$12, and type-writing \$10 per twenty one-hour lessons, except for students in other branches who pay \$5.00.

**NO VACATIONS.**

The WINTER TERM of 15 weeks will begin Dec. 30, but students can enter at any time, and are doing so continually, paying charges only from time of entering to time of leaving. Spring Term will begin April 13, '85, and Summer Institute July 6, '85.
