The twenty-ninth Annual Course of
instruction will begin the last week in Septem-
ber 1886 and close in March 1887. The course
of instruction is graded, students being di-
vided into first, second and third year classes.
Qualifications for admission are either a de-
gree of A. B., a certificate of a reputable ac-
ademy, a teacher's certificate, or a prelimi-
nary examination.

The method of instruction is conspicuously
practical, and is applied in the wards of the
Mercy, St. Luke's and Michael Reese Hos-
pitals daily at the bedside of the sick, and in
the South side dispensary attached to the Col-
lege, where from nine to ten thousand pa-
tients are annually treated. Fees: Matricu-
lation, \$5. Lectures, first and second years,
each \$75. Demonstrator including material
\$10. Laboratory \$5. Breakage (returnable)
\$5. Hospitals: Mercy \$6. St. Luke's \$5.,
for second and third year students. Final
examination \$30.
