Getting on the cars at Omaha going west, we pass along through a fine country of land, with numerous fields of corn, and from the numerous stacks of grain in the fields, denotes that a splendid crop of wheat has been harvested.

The grasshoppers are still pegging away at the remaining grain and garden truck in Clear Creek Valley.

The biggest onion, weighing just a pound and three-quarters, was raised near Pueblo.

Del Norte has gone wild again over another new discovery. This time it is gold quartz, and assays \$5,000 per ton.

Seventeen United States citizens were murdered within two weeks in the Territory of Colorado, and \$30,000 worth of property destroyed or carried off by the Indians.

A company is organizing in Salt Lake City, numbering already over two hundred men and women, to settle upon fruit land in San Berardino county, California.

A cloud-burst above the town of Coalville, Utah, on Thursday last, deluged the town and filled the coal mines with water, necessitating a stoppage of work for several weeks.

The fruit crop for this season is far ahead of anything ever before produced in Utah Valley.

THE waves in Lake Tahoe last week ran so high that the various crafts used in navigating it waters were in danger of being demolished.

MONITOR valley is being surveyed by United States surveyors.

There was a frost in Washoe Valley last Friday night, which damaged the potato crop slightly.

THE actual loss of property by the Eureka flood is over \$150,000, exclusive of the distress occasioned by a large number of men being thrown out of employment.

THE main pipe leading from the air compressor at the Consolidated Virginia mine, has reached the 1,500-foot level.

There are 265 offices to be filled at the ensuing election in the State, as follows: One United States Senator, 2 Supreme Judges, 9 District Judges, 2 Congressmen, 9 State Legislators, and 250 county and township officers.

Nearly every county in Oregon claims undeveloped coal mines.

Estimates of this year's crop of flax seed in Oregon foot up 100,000 bushels.

A Salem establishment expects to turn out 200,000 grain bags before the 1st of November.

The card, spinning, and a part of the weaving rooms are running night and day at the Willamette woolen factory.

An establishment for the preparation of green tow, such as is used by upholsterers, is being erected at Salem in connection with the oil mill.

Farmers are meeting with excellent success in the gathering of their crops. The weather is all that could be wished, and the yield will, as a general thing, be bountiful.

At the Roseburg Land Office, during the month of July, there were 2,328 acres of land entered under the Homestead Act, and 1,247 acres as final homestead entries.
