EDITOR REE . At first sight Plattsmouth appears to be a mixture of the old river town and the new railroad town. They came to time promptly over a year ago, with county bonds for \$150,000, which I believe they ask. Would it not be handy now for the people of Omaha to have an O. & S. W. railroad to connect with the proposed trunk line. In a little over one year more the time stipulated will expire. Are the people of this State waiting for the Iowa pool to build the trunk line to St. Louis?

Political matters here are a good deal mixed. PRIVATE SMITH.

Nebraska ? One year ago William Coffin, o Platte county, bought 175 sheep at three dollars a head, and borrowed money from the bank at two per cent. a month-\$525. In one year's time the flock have paid for themselves, besides a profit of \$400, making in all, \$925 from a very small flock of sheep, on borrowed capital, at heavy interest. Mr. Coffin says that from every ton of hay, by feeding it to sheep and cattle, he realizes \$12. The sheep eat out all the weeds, shoe-string vines, &c. with the cattle cleaning up all without waste. From this flock of 175, Mr. C. sheared 577 pounds of wool, and sold it for 40 cents a pound realizing \$227.80. The demand for wool is always good, and the prices will range from 40 to 50 cents per pound, owing to quality. Mr. C. also sold twenty-five of his flock for \$4 per head, \$100, and his flock is now increased 70 lambs worth \$4 a head, \$280. We could go on giving figures, but in this article only aim to give a few of the facts.
