

A Blaine Victory—The Third Termers Routed.

A Solid Blaine Delegation Sent to Chicago.

After an All Night Session.

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The republican state convention to elect delegates to the national convention at Chicago was one of the most exciting in the political annals of the party in Nebraska. The Grant boomers had mustered all their available forces for the occasion, and a number of their self-constituted leaders were early on the ground endeavoring to form an alliance with such of the disaffected as would pick up the fragments of the Blaine delegation. The result is told in our full special dispatch, which we append, and which show that the sentiment of Nebraska will be faithfully represented in Chicago and her preference there expressed for the plumed knight.

Special dispatch to the Bee.

COLUMBUS, May 19.—The town has been rapidly filling up with delegates all day, and the various tele have held their capacity tested to the utmost in order to accommodate the crowds which each succeeding train has been pouring into the city. The political activity of the various elements has been at its height during the whole afternoon, and the also has been reported in fully ten different ways, no one of which probably be found to stand the test of a final vote. The Grant forces are well under control, and the leaders of that faction are working considerable skill in their manipulations. The Grant strength is ambitious, as reported in THE BEE a week since, and the final vote will show a clear Blaine majority of over one hundred.

At 7 o'clock in the evening the opera house was crowded, every available seat being filled and the spectators throbbing the audience room. J. W. Daves, chairman of the state central committee, called the convention to order, and G. W. Collins was made temporary chairman, and B. D. Evans, A. E. Cady and A. D. Braden temporary secretaries.

The appointment of the committee on credentials was made on a basis of nine Blaine men and four Grant men, and very fairly represented the relative strength of the elements in the convention. Hon. J. L. Webster, of Omaha, was appointed chairman and the remainder of the committee was constituted as follows: Stone, of Saline; Marsh, of Clay; Palmer, of Cass; Majors, of Nemaha; Tazewell, of Sarpy; Cornish, of Polk; Thummel, of H. I.; Ries, of Lincoln; Gilbert, of Webster; Ehardt, of Stant; Barnes, of Cuming; and Daves, of Saline, at large.

The committee then withdrew, and the following committee on permanent organization and resolutions were appointed:

On permanent organization: Telford, of Cass, Caldwell of Nuckolls, Collins of DeWalt, Brown of Douglas and Wilson of Johnson.

On resolutions: Cropper of Lancaster, Slaughter of Nance, Cowin of Douglas, Nye of Dodge and Laird of Adams.

The committee on credentials were absent for about two hours. In the meantime the bulk of the convention was occupied by prominent republican speakers. When this committee on credentials came in they reported all the counties unopposed except the delegations from Gage, Hitchcock and Nance counties. A test vote being taken on the Gage county delegates, it resulted in two hundred and fifty-four votes for the Blaine and one hundred and eight votes for the Grant men. It was voted to admit a delegation from St. Louis county.

The balloting proceeded under great excitement. The Grant men seeing that they were in a hopeless minority and endeavoring to ally themselves to disaffected Blaine delegates. At a late hour the contest over the state for Chicago is still in progress, and there every prospect of an all-night session.

COLUMBUS, Neb., May 20, 6 a. m.—After an all night session and a most spirited contest, in which the Grant forces were admirably handled in connection with unreliable Blaine men, the convention at five o'clock this morning elected a solid Blaine delegation to Chicago. The following are the delegates: James W. Daves of Saline, Lorenzo Crouse of Washington, Captain Mitchell of Otto, N. P. Persinger of Merrick, Judge Gaslin of Franklin, and Dr. Lewis of Boone county. The convention passed resolutions expressing preference for Blaine, but no other instructions. The majority for Blaine over Grant on each ballot averaged one hundred.

The vote on the Blaine delegates to Chicago stood as follows: Daves, 245; Mitchell, 242; Crouse, 242; Persinger, 241; Gaslin, 231; Lewis, 242; For Grant—Dew, 123; Greer, 126; Reese, 126; Laird, 138; Westernman, 126.
