



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

THE aged father of Senator Gordon, of Georg a, who has just resigned his seat in the United States senate, has taken up his pen now, at the age of 85, to vindicate his son from the imputations that he was "bought up" or "bargained out." The old gentleman, in a letter to the Atlantic Constitution, makes a touching appeal to the people of Georgia, and thu reasons why the senator should be allowed to act his own pleasure without being censured for such action:

"Let those who condemn his course put themselves in his place. He had served his people in war and in peace with undying devotion. His salary is not sufficient to support his family and moet all his needs for money. He is not rich; after years of toil in his country's service, he comes out poorer than he went in. He is offered a poation which will afford him rest and quiet and a competency."

THE New York Tribune sees in the coming convention a perfect parellel to that of 1860, when Seward's supporters were as confident of his election on the first ballot as General Grant's supporters now are of the selection of the third term candidate. 


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
