TALE OF A TRAVELLER.

How a Flying Train Was Wrecked on the Plains. A Graphic Story of a Moonlit Horror.

The accounts received Monday of the wreck of the east bound train in this city at 3:25 p. m. yesterday, were very startling and sensational. Superintendent Clark being out on this line all cases were sent directly to him, and he at once ordered the train to be taken to the west and the wreck to be repaired.

From one of the passengers who was on the ill-fated train we learned the graphic story of perhaps the worst wreck that has occurred within the history of the Union Pacific road.
