BROKE LOOSE.

The Gang of Robbers and House-Breakers at Work Again, And Causing General Alarm and Extra Precautions.

About 6 o'clock Friday evening two boys entered Doyle's news depot on Douglas street and began looking about idly at the goods, one of the boys, for the sake of an excuse probably, pinching some pocket diary, etc., while the other took a hasty inventory of the stock. Mrs. Doyle is in the store alone at the time, and her suspicions were aroused by the talk and actions of the boys, so much so, that she placed some valuable out of reach and encouraged their belief that goods could be purchased cheaper down town. At length one of the boys dropped a finely bound volume of "A Fool's Errand" on the floor as he was trying to get it in his pocket and they started to go, one of them quite hurriedly, and Mrs. Doyle saw some of the pocket-books, dime novels, etc., sticking out of his pocket. She seized his companion and demanded of him the pay for the stolen articles. About this time Mr. Ray came along and the first boy had been hiding near by, broke and ran followed by Mr. Ray, who had learned what the trouble was, crying "stop thief" loud enough to attract attention. The fugitives, whose name was John Gansner, ran across 15th street toward the postoffice, scattering his plunder on either side as he went. In front of the postoffice he ran plump into the arms of Major Furray, who took him in then and there, and walked him back to Mrs. Doyle's, where he was searched and a number of articles found on his person. Those that he had thrown away were picked up and returned afterwards. The prisoner offered to pay the damage, even to the amount of \$25, but Mrs. Doyle refused to compromise, and he was taken to jail, where he now awaits examination on the charge of petit larceny.
