A FATAL FEUD.

A Railroad Yardmaster Murdered at Laramie.
Freight Conductor C. A. Peronett Believed to be the Murderer.
The body of Yardmaster Graves, of the U. P. railroad, who has charge of the company's grounds at Laramie, was found between 2 and 3 o'clock yesterday dead in the yard, at that place, having been shot at some unknown person. Circumstances point strongly to C. A. Peronett, freight conductor of the U. P. railroad, as having been the guilty party, and he was arrested. At 10 o'clock this morning the coroner's jury was in session, but the result of their deliberations is not yet learned.

IRELAND'S RIGHTS.

An Eloquent Lecture by Mr. John Devoy in Clark's Hall.
Mr. John Devoy, an eloquent and prominent leader of the Irish nationalists for over twenty years, lectured at Clark's hall, on the corner of Dodge and Fourteenth streets, Thursday, under the auspices of the Emmet Memorial association. The subject of the lecture was "The Irish National Cause and Present Crisis." The large audience room was filled with earnest and intelligent Irishmen and friends of Ireland's cause. Music of an excellent nature was furnished by the A. O. H. band, who played several selections preceding and after the lecture. Rev. Geo. W. Pepper, of Ohio, a clergyman of the Methodist church, was announced to be present, but did not arrive. The speaker of the evening was introduced by Mr. C. V. Gallagher in a few fitting remarks, and proceeded to eloquently, thoughtfully and ably handle the subject of his theme for nearly two hours and a half. His speech, of which the following is a brief synopsis, was frequently interrupted by applause. He said:
"I do not propose to go through the history of Ireland to note the causes of her misfortunes, or to trace the long struggle for independence which had a direct bearing toward Irish freedom. In considering the past movements for freedom in Ireland it is foolish to ignore the fact that a great majority of the Irish farmers have held aloof from the Irish national movement, and that the leaders and active workers in Ireland are Irishmen. A WOMAN'S SUICIDE.

A Woman of Speculation and Love—Poisoning Herself in New York.
On a window of a Pullman coach running between here and Ogden was seen the name of Kate Mendheim, cut with a diamond ring, and in a woman's delicate handwriting. A strangely romantic history in connection with the life and tragic death of the lady bearing that name has recently come to light. A few days ago a press dispatch from New York City announced the suicide of Miss Kate Mendheim, who had registered at the St. James hotel the Saturday previous under the name of Mrs. C. M. Johnson. On Sunday evening she was found dead in her room and a post-mortem revealed that she had been poisoned by morphine. The name of a young man in San Francisco, who was supposed to know the victim of suicide was found, to whom a letter was written and the reply which was received furnishes a clue to her identity. It was discovered that she was the adopted daughter of Morris Mendheim, of Custer and Mendheim, real estate agents in San Francisco, and had been educated in the best seminaries of Hamburg.

A BLAIR MAN IN LIMBO

He is Charged With Stealing Two Hogs from a Farmer.
S. F. Lewis, a farmer living about four miles from Blair, Washington county, was arrested in this city yesterday by Officer McClure on a charge of grand larceny. A telegraph dispatch was received in the forenoon by Marshal Westerdahl from Sheriff Boggs of Blair, to the effect that Lewis had stolen two hogs, and had probably come to this city with them. Lewis was found and admitted that he brought two dressed hogs to Omaha, and said he sold one to William Aust on 16th street, and the other to Henry Ritter, corner of 20th and Cumings streets, but claimed that they were his own and that he butchered them yesterday afternoon. He was arrested and taken to the county jail. Sheriff Boggs arrived in the afternoon and will probably take Lewis to Blair in this morning.

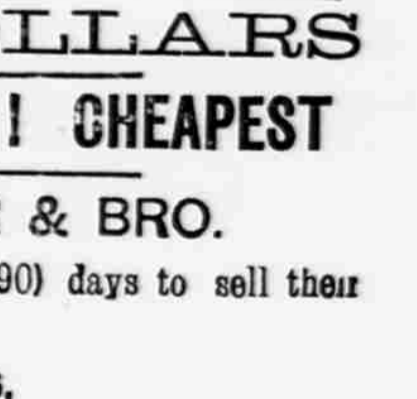
