The New Case's Advocates.

The resignation of Gen. Lorin Melick and the appointment of Gen. Ignatieff to a prominent post in the government is considered here as about the worst news that could be received from St. Petersburg. That, however, is not all. It seems probable that Gen. Tchernoff will be made minister of war, and that Katkoff, another well-known Pan-Slavist, who, if I am not mistaken, is proprietor of The Moscow Gazette, is also to enter the ministry.

Thus Alexander III. has begun to reign in good earnest, and has lost no time in surrounding himself by the most prominent members of a party which for many years past has recognized him as their chief. There is no good reason to believe that the fall of Gen. Lorin Melick is due in no small measure to the antagonism of Count Schouvaloff, who represents the influence of Germany at the Russian court. It will be remembered that Lorin Melick was reported to have been stigmatized as a charlatan by Prince Bismarck, and somebody suggests to-day that in the chancellor's mind, perhaps, the word is synonymous with "liberal." It is also generally believed that the czar's resolve to abide by the autocratic regime of his predecessors was encouraged, if not originally conceived, from Berlin. It is known, at all events, that Count Schouvaloff manifested strong opposition to the introduction of liberal reform.

There is a missing link in the chain of recent events at Petersburg. How comes it that the influence of Germany, as exercised through Count Schouvaloff, should be powerful enough to estrange the czar from all idea of abandoning personal rule, and to bring about the resignation of Gen. Lorin Melick, but that it should not have been able to prevent the accession to office of the Pan-Slavist, and in particular of Gen. Ignatieff, the rival of Count Schouvaloff and the sworn enemy of Germany.

In the absence of another explanation, I am inclined to attribute this strange feature in Russian affairs to the character of Alexander III. He has much more in common with his grandfather, the Emperor Nicholas, than with his father, the late czar. Like the former, he is penetrated with the principle of divine right, and the autocratic sentiment of his great ancestor is his second nature. He would therefore lend a willing ear to advice urging him not to yield one iota to the crowd, and that government. On the other hand, he is not the man to sacrifice long-cherished theories representing for him a kind of national creed, which on more than one occasion, caused a coolness to arise between him and the late czar.

When Alexander III. ascended the throne, those who knew him best foretold that he would be the Muscovite czar par excellence, and that even expected that he would remove the imperial residence to Moscow. Of course, many events may occur—in due time, there is too much probability that they will—which would interfere with the programme that Gen. Ignatieff called upon to carry out. As matters stand at present, the programme is reassuring neither for Russia nor for Europe. It implies iron-hand repression at home, and a policy of duplicity and aggression abroad.

Emigration and Labor.

While every steamer that comes to our shores brings hundreds of hardy, deserving peasants, there are stories of distress in the principal cities—the never-ceasing cry for work. The problem of finding employment for the large accumulation of idle men, one that should not be overlooked. The development of new railway interests in the extreme west and south-west, and the steady, increased business activity make labor abundant. There is no reason why an honest, able-bodied man should loiter around New York or Philadelphia if he can find his way into the west. In the report of the Denver & Rio Grande railway, written a few weeks since, we have a statement of the difficulties encountered by a manager of that road in extending their lines. The writer says that the most serious difficulty has been the securing of a sufficient supply of good labor, and yet it has been the contractors' duty to keep their grading camps full during the summer of 1880, the road would have been completed. "The highest wages," says the writer, "ever paid to railroad laborers in Colorado are now being paid by contractors who are exceptionally responsible, and yet it has been with the utmost difficulty that the force has been kept up to its present efficiency." This company has been compelled to advance the fares of laborers from Canada, St. Louis and Chicago, but in most cases men who accepted employment under these conditions ran away or went to the mines or returned home. The president arrives at the conclusion that labor obtained in this way is not desirable, and that most of the applicants for the opportunity of working on the Denver road were anxious to get a free ride to Colorado. Efforts were made to bring negroes from the south, but without success.
