PHILADELPHIA, June 14. - The pres sure for steel and iron rails is unabated. A heavy week's business has been transacted, chiefly in iron rails at \$46 to \$47. The mills have capac ity engaged up to September 1. New inquiries continue to come in. Steel rails are subject to active inquiry for western and southwestern roads, and small orders have been placed this week on more reasonable terms, viz., \$60, in consequence of foreign competition. Heavy orders con-tinue to go abroad, some for castern and some for north-western roads. Winter and spring deliveries are being slowly contracted for at \$56 to \$58. The old rail mar-ket has taken another downward turn in consequence of the determined ef-fort of holders of rails in bond to unload before paying duties. Thirty thousand tons were offered to-day in one lot. Consumers' wants are supplied and sellers are obliged to concede liberally. Forge pig iron is dull at \$19. A few furnaces have gone out of blast, some to repair, others because of low prices; others are threatening to follow. The outlook is not encouraging. Imports continue heavy. Foreign production is in creasing and prices are weakening. Bessemer pig is active. Bar iron and construction iron of all kinds continue in active demand and are improving
