Business circles in this city for the past week have been pervaded by an activity quite the same as during the several immediately preceding it. The volume of traffic since the beginning of warm weather and the removal of snow and water blockades has flowed in an uninterrupted stream, much freer than a year ago which was ahead of anything known until shaded by the present season.

Such staples as dry goods, groceries, boots and shoes, ready made clothing, etc., building material of all kinds, were in very good request, prices being steady; staple groceries were generally firm at full prices.
