FAREWELL SERMON,

to His People Yesterday.

Rev. W. K. Beans preached his farewell sermon to a large congregaion in the Eighteenth street Metho dist church Sunday morning. He took for his text, II Cor. 13, 11: "Finally brethren farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace and the God of love and peace shall be with you." The paster dwelt especially on the fact that farewells are and must often be spoken. That though they cause sadness and pain, yet that does not at all affect their repetition. At the conclusion of the sermon he spoke as

"I will now give a brief outline

view of the work of the church during the present pastorate now about to close. Upon taking charge of the three years ago I found a membership of seventy-seven, of that number six have died; Brother Whitman, Sister Marston, Brother and Sister Burdett, Sister Harris and Sister Bowker. Twelve have moved out of the city, seven have with-drawn, two have been dropped. Total loss twenty-seven, leaving fifty of the original members. I have received into the church one hundred. Of this number five have died, Brother and Sister Stein, Brother and Sister Housel and Brother Brough; thirty-one have moved out of the city, eleven have withdrawn, three have been dropped, leave of these acces sions fifty. Total membership one hundred, made up half of the old and half of the new while we have lost seventy-seven members during the present pastorate a number equal to the entire membership when I came. We are still thirty stronger than we were. We have now with us fifty members who were not in sight when my labors began. On the official board, teaching the Sunday school, doing most efficient work along the lines of church work with the present outlook for the city's growth, the people coming here on every train, it is reasonable to an ticipate that the next pastorate will witness much larger accessions from this source.

In the financial work of the church we have been able to meet all our obligations, a floating debt of \$600 has been paid, the pastor's salary, the presiding elder's claim, the current expense and benevolent claims, have been generally met. This amounted in al!, the first year, \$2.500; the second, \$2,600; this year to \$2,000; in all, \$7,900. In this regard the church will compare most creditably with any church in the state, great or small. In the line of improvement of church property we may mention that the walls and entry corner 11th and Farnof the church have been kalsomined at an expense of \$100, and our ham Streets heating facilities perfected at an expense of \$75, the parsonage walls have been papered, the windows improved by weights and shutters at an expense of fully \$175.

In the line of church work, aside from pulpit preparation and pastoral labor, the vocal means of grace and Sunday school work, I have baptized 14, married 26 couples, attended 44 funerals, introduced our church papers into 36 houses, received into our church 100.
