KEOKUK, Iowa, October 16 .- The Mississippi continues to rise slowly and surely, making the outlook at this pot, and work has been suspended at the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific shops, the Keokuk & St. Louis shops and McGavic's mill, on account of the floods. The Keokuk & St. Louis line track between this city and Canton, is covered at intervals with water from two inches to a foot deep, and passen-gery are being transferred by boat. Oshkosh, Wis., October 16.—A telegram from New London this afternoon brings the news of the breaking away of the Post Lake dam, forty

miles above Shawano, which augments the fears of a great flood. St. Paul, Minn., October 16.—Reports from the rivers in Wisconsin are to the effect that the flood is subsiding. At the same time the effect of the late storm has not yet been felt, and further trouble is anticipated. Along the Minnesota in this state the flood has swept away most of the hay the farmers are suffering for want of fodder for their stock.
