A Little Child Burned to Death
in Its Cradle.

A terrible accident occurred about 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon which resulted a few hours later in the death of the victim, a little two-year-old 16,360 of the victim, a little two-year-old resides on Capitol avenue near Tenth street.

Mrs. Spencer was at the time alone with her children, the eldest, little Eddie, three years old. She was in one of the front rooms, probably asleep, and the children in the kitchen, the baby in its cradle. The baby's face is covered with marks of a curious shape for a burn from flames, but its back and limbs are completely roasted and the skin peeledoff in blisters. How the fire caught no one knows. Dr. Wood was summoned and pronounced the injuries fatal, but recommended great care which might possibly save the child's life. At midnight a police whistle was blown long and loud by the woman, but the neighbors, accus-tomed to such sounds paid no attention. A policeman came and found the woman alone with her dead baby. She had been without help or com panionship when its life lamp flickered out and was alone with the poor little form and her sleeping boy until day-light this morning. This in the centre of such a city and in the most thickly populated part of it.

Coroner Jacobs went down this morning but did not deem an inquest necessary. The funeral will take place to-morrow.
