Some, having no regard for personal appearance, stalk along with solid hands and faces. The unhealthy nature of their work is shown in their movements and countenances. They are generally younger than their more aristocratic sisters of the department. Age and experience is not necessary to be a plate printer's assistant. Painful stories are told of the insulta these girls are subjected to by their "hosses," but many of the stories are doubtless exaggerated, as there are two sides to the question. It certainly is not a pleasant position for a young woman of delicate instincts to occupy, that of assistant to a half-clad man, by whose side she is required to remain all day, and upon whose report she is dependent to a large extent for her position.
