CORN, Ia., November 3.—This is not a mint, although there is considerable money being coined here. Two years ago the town site of Corn was nothing more attractive than "hump" on the wide prairie.

of April destroys them. A northern slope does not thaw out entirely in March, and as long as the frost is about the roots the buds do not start, and it is advisable to mulch the trees in order to hold the frost in the ground until proper time.

Hamilton County Crops. In your issue of October 26 under the head of "Aurora" from your correspondent Ranger, appears the following: "The crops here are simply unsurpassed by any spot in Nebraska."

Our County Agricultural Society meeting was set for 29th, the day I received The Bee, and we also had a County Alliance meeting.

Having for many years been a reporter on crops for our government and also for Prime's crop bureau, I have by inquiring of threshing machine men and farmers relative to crops, and also being a farmer and traveling some among farms, have tried to arrive at the correct estimate of crops.

Corn is placed by none at over 20 bushels per acre an average. Some put it as low as 15. Our county first premium crop was 52 bushels; the second 42 bushels.
