TRANS-ATLANTIC.

The French Cabinet Tender Their Resignations to President Grevy.

The Resignations Accepted—A New Cabinet to be Formed.

The Rumor Again Current That Bismarck Will Resign.

The Old Cabinet Requested to Remain Until a New Ministry is Found.

The Russian War Budget to be Reduced 60,000,000 Roubles.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

BERLIN, November 10.—The report that Prince Bismarck really contemplates resigning continues to be repeated. The provincial correspondent of a journal, devoted to the existing ministry, and sometimes believed to be inspired by Bismarck, reproduces the article from The Post of yesterday concerning the reported resignation, but makes no comment on it.

RUSSIAN WAR BUDGET.

ST. PETERSBURG, November 10.—Advices from St. Petersburg say that it is reported that a diminution of 60,000,000 roubles is to be made in the Russian war budget. This would indicate that Russia does not at present contemplate any foreign military enterprises.

THE FRENCH MINISTRY.

PARIS, November 10.—The long expected event has at last taken place. After the cabinet meeting to-day M. Jules Ferry and his fellow ministers presented their resignations to President Grevy. He accepted them with formal expressions of regret and esteem.

STOCKHOLDERS' MEETING.

LONDON, November 10.—There was a very large meeting of the stockholders of the Reading railroad this afternoon, over five hundred being present. A unanimous vote of confidence in Mr. Gowen was adopted.

BELIEVED TO BE AN INFERNAL MACHINE.

Sir Vernon Harcourt and Mr. Forster have examined a box which has been forwarded from America to Mr. Creyke, member of parliament. It is believed that the screws fastening the box have at their base some kind of an explosive. The investigation is proceeding.

AN ARREST.

LONDON, November 10.—A dispatch from Constantinople announces that the arrest of Kavass, of the American consulate at Salonica, for brigandage has been satisfactorily arranged by Said Pasha and General Wallace, minister of the United States. The governor of Salonica delivered Kavass to the American consul, and the consul placed him at the disposal of the porte for trial by an ordinary tribunal, not by court martial, a representative of the American consul to be present.

PARIS, November 10.—M. Ferry and his colleagues in the ministry have resigned and President Grevy has accepted their resignations.

WHOLESALE MASSES.

LONDON, November 10.—A dispatch says the king of Ashante has caused the massacre of 260 young girls in order to use their blood to mix the mortar used in erecting the state building. The English government has ordered their representative to protest against this butchery and to make inquiries.

MINNESOTA AND MASSACHUSETTS LEGISLATURES.

ST. PAUL, Minn., November 10.—The legislature did little of general interest to-day. The most important bill passed was one granting the railroad the right of way over swamp lands and another repealing the law making stock holders in manufacturing companies liable for double the amount of their stock.

CONDITION OF THE METHODIST CHURCH.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 10.—Bishop Warren, of Atlanta, Ga., Marcell, of Chicago, Fos, of St. Paul, Minn., and Peck, of Syracuse, N. Y., were present to-day at the opening session of the general committee of the church extension of the Methodist Episcopal church of the United States. The report for the last ten months shows an increase of last year's receipts of \$27,416 and the total disbursements \$249,322, leaving a cash balance of \$30,470 on hand.

STOREY SNUED.

CHICAGO, November 10.—Class Warden, late correspondent of the Chicago Times, commenced suit to-day against Editor Storey for \$500, the amount agreed upon for stealing an advance copy of President Hayes' message. Storey refused to pay.

INDICATIONS.

WASHINGTON, November 11.—For the lower lake region: Northwest and southwest winds, falling barometer, generally cloudy weather and light rain or snow and stationary or slight rise in temperature. For the upper Mississippi and lower Missouri valleys: Generally cloudy weather, light rain or snow, rising temperature, followed by falling barometer, winds, mostly from the east and south.

POSTPONED.

NEWARK, N. J., November 10.—The examination of Nugent has been postponed until 9 o'clock Monday morning next, the hour set down for that of Baldwin. More failures are feared.

CONDENSED LIGHTNING.

LYNN, Mass., November 10.—Mike Connelly and Dan Driscoll had a spree last night at the latter's house. The former becoming boisterous Driscoll gave him a dose of laudanum to quiet him, after which they both drank beer. Connelly then went home. At 10:05 o'clock he was taken sick and died at 1:30 this morning. Driscoll is under arrest.

CINCINNATI, November 10.—John Theuber, of Hamilton, Ohio, who recently won a wrestling match has deposited \$100 and offers to wrestle any man in America weighing less than 150 pounds. Greek-Roman for \$200 to \$500 a side.

DOUGLASSVILLE, Ga., November 10.—Mr. Wm. Kilgo, acting as executive officer, attempted to arrest Wm. Zann. Zann struck Kilgo with a shovel and Kilgo fired at Zann with a pistol. Death immediately resulted.

COLUMBUS, Ga., November 10.—Ed. Partridge, a negro at Americus, beat his step daughter to death Monday, and was arrested, but escaped.

TRACY CITY, Tenn., November 10.—Four convicts, Bill Curtis, Harry Cornell, Anderson and Johnson escaped from the branch penitentiary last night by sawing through the wall. During the melee two convicts got to fighting, and one killed an other.

SPRINGFIELD, Tenn., November 10.—Judge John Woodard's distillery burned last night. No insurance; loss \$20,000.

CHICAGO, November 10.—The international agricultural convention was in session to-day and evening. Resolutions were adopted looking toward more prompt and accurate crop reports. Committees were appointed and the convention adjourned to meet next year.

FRENCH AND GERMAN GUESTS.

NEW YORK, November 10.—Among the passengers who sailed to-day on the steamer St. Laurent for Havre were M. La Marquis De Rochambeau and Mme. La Marquis De Rochambeau, delegates to the Yorktown centennial celebration. A party of friends assembled on the wharf to bid them "bon voyage." A number of French delegates to the Yorktown celebration departed this evening for the west to make an extended tour of the country. The German delegates were given a banquet this afternoon by the German club. It is not certain that the Germans will return home to-morrow as was intended.

NEW YORK, November 10.—The Von Steuben family who were delegates sent by Germany to the Yorktown centennial, left for home to-day on the steamer Winland.

ACCIDENTAL SHOOTING.

BOSTON, November 10.—Geo. S. Dally, aged eighteen years, proprietor of "the arcade," North Scituate, was found in his store this morning in a pool of blood, suffering from a pistol wound in the left side near the heart. When found he was semi-conscious and when interviewed as to the cause of the act said that last night at 11 o'clock when about to close up for the night one of the pistols kept in the store accidentally went off and being unable to make any outcry he was obliged to remain where he was until assistance reached him this morning.

THE HENNEPIN CANAL.

CHICAGO, November 10.—The meeting of the commission appointed at Davenport, Iowa, in May, to organize for effective work to secure assistance from congress for the construction of the Hennepin canal, was held in this city to-day. The proposed canal extends from Hennepin, Ill., to the Mississippi river at Davenport. It will cost \$3,500,000. It will shorten the distance to Chicago thirty-five miles. Speeches favorable to the project were made by Senator Logan, General Henderson, Judge Murphy and others.

FIRES.

ST. LOUIS CITY, Iowa, November 10.—During the temporary absence of their parents three young children of Anton Hinck, living near Marcus, this state, set fire to the house and were burned to death. Mr. Hinck discovered the flames and was seriously burned trying to capote the children.

TEXAS STATE CAPITOL BURNED.

AUSTIN, Texas, November 10.—The state capitol building burned last night. All the archives of the republic, Texas battle flags, portraits and paintings were destroyed. Loss about \$200,000.

JEWELRY STORE ROBBERY.

KANSAS CITY, November 10.—Two masked men entered the jewelry store of F. A. Shoak, in Kansas City at 7 o'clock to-night and robbed it of \$1,500 worth of goods. The store at the time of the robbery was in charge of a boy, who was held by one of the masked men while the other stole the articles. No clue to the thieves.

CAPTURED HIS MAN.

PLATTSBOROUGH, Neb., November 10.—Sheriff Hyers returned this morning from Atchison county, Mo., with Milton Brown, the thief who stole Thomas, Wife's team and wagon, last week, in this county. The thief is safely lodged in jail here.

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
