Profits of Sheep.

A farm can be stocked with sheep cheaper than with any other animals. Sheep will come nearer to utilizing everything which grows on the farm. Less labor will be required for getting Corner 10th and Howard feed and stock together. The returns will come in sooner and oftener than with any farm stock except hogs. Less money is required for shelter and fencing, and less labor is required in herding, when outside pasturage is accessible and preferred. And finally, a handsome income on the investment can be had without the sale of the animals themselves.

Notes.

The leaves and withered branches of wild cherry contain a large per cent. of prussic acid, and if eaten in large quantities general prove fatal.

One hundred hens of the smaller breeds would require a building 25 by 50 feet, and 8 feet high at the peak, and a yard containing two acres. Fowls are, as a general thing, confined to the buildings in winter.

All stock sheds should now be carefully inspected to see that the posts are strong and the poles in good order, so that a heavy snow cannot break them down and thus kill the stock. Remember last winter, and prepare for such a winter in good season. It will pay to be ready for any


