Eight Silver Streams and Eight Pots of Gold.

The Second Grand Show by the Omaha Water Works Managers.

A Network of Lace Across Farnam, and Fifteenth.

## A Beautiful and Brilliant Display.

The calm air yesterday and the bright sunshine, made the managers of the water works think it an excellent opportunity to make the test, which has been twice postponed on account of the wind, which drives the water off in spray and prevents accurate measurements.

At ten o'clock the majority of the city council, Mayor Boyd, Chief Galligan and other officials, with a number of prominent citizens and tax payers, met manager
Shelt n at the corner of Fifteenth and
Farnham, from which they were pe pared
to witness the second test of the works.
