proclamation yesterday: WHEREAS, There exists in the cities of Atchison, Leavenworth, Topeka, Kansas City (Kansas), Wyandotte, and Dodge City, in this state, a com-bination of evil-disposed persons who are notoriously and defiantly violating the provisions of section 10, article 15, of the constitution of the state of Kansas, and chapter 128 of the laws of 1881, passed in pursuance thereof, being an act entitled "An act to prohibit the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, except for medical, scientific and mechanical

purposes, and to regulate the sale thereof for such purposes;" and, Whereas, Section 3 of article 1 of said constitution provides that the supreme executive power of the state shall be vested in a governor, who

shall see that the laws are faithfully Now, therefore, I, John P. St. John, governor of the state of Kansas, by the authority vested in me, prompted by not only a sense of duty, but a desire and determination to use the lawful means at my command to suppress lawlessness and bring to just punishment all persons who so defiantly trample under foot the will of the people as expressed through the constitution and laws of the state, do

hereby offer the following rewards: For the arrest and final conviction of each and every person guilty of selling intoxicating liquors in violation of the law in either of the cities above

For the arrest and conviction of each and every person or persons guilty of maintaining a common nuisance and final abatement as a nuisance of the place so maintained under the provisions of section 13 of said chapter 128, one hundred dollars.

For the arrest, conviction and re-moval from office of the city marshal of either of the above named cities for a failure to perform the duties imposed upon such officers under the provisions of section 12 of said chapter 128, the sum of three hundred dollars.

For the arrest, conviction and removal from office of each and every policeman in either of said cities for for Antwerp. a failure to perform the duties imposed on such officers under the provisions Liverpool. of said section, the sum of one hundred dollar.

moval from office of the sheriff of Sailed-The City of Berlin for New the county in which either of said York. cities is situate, for a failure to perform the duties imposed on such officers under the provisions of section 12, the sum of three hundred dollars.

For the arrest, conviction and re-moval from office of the county attorney of the county in which either of said cities is situated, for a failure to perform the duties imposed on such officer under the provisions of said section 12, the sum of three hundred dollars.

Claims for rewards under the provisions hereof must be verified by affidavits and be accompanied by a duly certified copy of the judgment of conviction. Upon examination all claims found to be correct and in due form will be approved and presented to the legislature with a recommendation that an appropriation be made to

pay the same.

Persons who have conversed with him since the close of court Fri-day, say he is getting disturbed over Shaw's testimony. He insists that the alleged conversation to the effect that he would become notorious, even if he imitated Wilkes Booth, is false,

Scoville and wife have left the Tremont house and taken private lodgings on Indiana avenue. This is said to have been prompted by a desire on their part to be relieved from too frequent advice as to the conduct of the trial by the prisoner's brother. Another motive, however, is suggested by persons pro-fessing inside knowledge. They de-clare that Scoville has lost considerable money in the defense and is hard pressed for funds. In corroboration of this view they point to the fact that Scoville has decided to

next Wednesday on the subject of the trial, with 50 cents admission, to raise funds to carry on the trial for the defense. The announcement for the lecture says: "Mr. Scoville will give some incidents connected with the case that may appropriately be presented at a public meeting and yet not be appropriate in the court room."
