FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

FINANCIAL.

New York, January 14.
Events of the week in financial circles were important for sudden and marked improvement in affairs on the stock exchange. Money was easy throughout the week and the rate for call loans ranged from 6 to 3 per cent., with most of the business at 4@5 per cent. Foreign exchanges were firm and were twice advanced, 4@5 being the rate buoyant at the close. Government bonds were in active demand and advanced sharply. Railway and miscellaneous speculation was unsettled early in the week on conflicting rumors in regard to trunk line negotiations, but later on, when it became definitely known that favorable progress had been made, the market became active and assumed a buoyant tone. There were enormous transactions in the trunk line and other leading shares, with a general and sharp advance in price. The advance ranged from 1 to 6 per cent., and even more in some of the specialties. As the features of the week was the contest for the control of the Reading railroad, in which Mr. Gowen was victorious, the stock declined sharply on the result, but afterwards partly recovered.

There was not much variation in prices during the week. A report from Pittsburgh that nails had been advanced 1@ caused a firmer feeling among local dealers, but up to this hour no changes have been made. Markets were generally quiet, and only a moderate business done. Dry wood merchants were doing a fair business with firm but unchanged market except in bleached cottons. Fruit of the Loon declined 1@ and Lonsdale advanced 1@.

Groceries were generally firm, sugars advancing 1@ to 1@. Salt, dry goods, per barrel advanced 1@. Lard declined 2@. Hams declined 2@. Bacon sides declined 1@.

Drugs steady, with but two changes in quotations during the week. Balsam Copia advanced 3@. Chloroform advanced 5@.

Hides, wool &c, quiet; green calf, weight under 8 lbs., advanced 1@.

In general produce there was only moderate trading.

Eggs showed a decline under heavy receipts.

Poultry in light demand and stronger.

Lemons advanced \$1.00 per box.

Grain—Wheat advanced 2@. Barley declined 1@. Rye advanced 1@. Corn advanced about 1@. Oats a fraction higher.

Hay declined \$1.00@ to 50 per ton.
