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VANDERBILT'S NEW HOUSE.

The Interior Decorations—Elegance of Finish and Beauty of Design—Descriptions of the Main Rooms.

The new house of W. H. Vanderbilt at Fifth and Fifty-first st. has been completed and is now occupied by the family.
