The Optical Phenomenon Witnessed in Omaha Tuesday Night.

Mother Shipton has been resurrect ed and stalks about in her grave clothes predicting us all kinds of mishaps and catastrophes, from a spell of polar cold to another bloody rebellion. And why? All on account of a beautiful and innocent optical display in the heavens last night.

Lunar halos are of very frequent occurrence in this latitude. Any one observing the sky carefully when the atmosphere is milky or hazy, and the stars seem dull, will notice a circle of prismatic colors formed around the moon, having a radius of 22 dethe moon occupying the center of the circle. The inner edge is colored red, and is tolerably well defined, the outer edge is of a pale blue, and is not sharply defined. rare a phenomena last night, and one the light may reach the eye reflected from such snow flakes as are situated on a horizontal circle passing through the moon. This circle never exhibits prismatic colors like the halo.

Near those points where the halo cut the parhelic circle there is a double cause of light, and here the illumination is sometimes so great as to present the appearance of a mock sun, and is called a paraselenae.

These, like halos, are of various kinds and degrees, and occur through the action of the sun's light as well as through the moon's, in which former case, however, they are called parhe-

lins . From this it will be seen that the beautiful display offered us by dame nature last night had no meteorlogical significance, causing neither cold nor heat, neither war nor famine, but is merely a freak, as a grouping, as it were, of certain atmospheric bedies in a proper light, which afford us the beautiful reflections.

The facts concerning the highway robbery are claimed to be that Smith "took a walk ' with some \$500 in his pockets and laid down on the sidewalk, under the impression that he was going to bed. Some one came along and relieved him of his coat, and the circumstances under which it was lost suggested the propriety of no investigation.

However, these things may be, true

or untrue, a change was made in the office, as above stated, and on Sunday Smith took his family out of town with him, leaving on an eastern train. It is now rumored that there has appeared a large deficit in Smith's accounts since his departure, and that the company is out about \$1,300. At the late hour last evening when this report was first made public, it was impossible to obtain more definite information, or to corroborate the rumor by figures from the books.

The reported deficiency will call to mind Smith's active part in the prosecution of Harry Garrigan, one of his agents, last summer on the charge of embezzlement. At that time Smith claimed that Garrigan had embezzied large amounts from him, but when the case came to trial in the district court the jury failed to find a sufficient sum to warrant conviction. Then Garrigan was re-arrested on the charge of forgery, and was convicted of forging an order for \$6. Upon this conviction he was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary, and is now serving out his time.
