In casting a retrospective glance at the history of Ireland, and in view of the present political situation in that country, one is struck with the fact that while Irishmen have long been in the enjoyment of the highest honors in the gift of the Crown throughout the Colonies and dependencies of the British Empire, they are excluded from participation in the government of the land of their birth. While in England Irishmen like Canning, Wellington and Castlereagh have shaped the policy of Cabinets, in the sister isle no Irishman, with the exception of the Marquis Wellesley, and more recently the Duke of Abercorn, has, since the brief Lord Lieutenancy of the Duke of Tyrconnell in the reign of James II., represented the Sovereign in the vice-regal office. The same rule, which has become a tradition of British statecraft, holds in all the important offices of the administration in Ireland. An eminent lawyer like the ex-Lord Chancellor O'Hagan may indeed assume the onerous duties of "Keeper of Her Majesty's Conscience," yet
