HAYES' LAST RECEPTION. An Episode Still Talked of in Washington Society.

Washington Letter to New York World. When all has been said of the stinging, the cant, the lack of dignity and general appearance of a man of fitness in things that characterized the social regime of the Hayeses, an exception must be made in favor of the reception given once every winter to the diplomatic corps.
