Continuance after continuance has been granted until the cases have been lost sight of completely. The Odd Fellows went over to Omaha yesterday in goodly numbers, accompanied by members of lodges from other parts of the state, and by the Juvenile band, which appeared for the first time in their new uniforms, which are very neat, indeed. The boys furnished some excellent music on the streets before they started for across the river. The case of Harzman, charged with extorting two dollars from a girl, by threatening her with arrest for shop-lifting, was tried yesterday before Judge Aylesworth. The judge decided that from the testimony it was evident that the girl had been beaten out of two dollars, but was not satisfied as to there being any criminality, and he reserved his decision until to-day. Took It Back. The Motion for a Change of Venue in Cranky Bill's Case Withdrawn. When the case of "Cranky Bill," charged with larceny, was brought up before Judge Aylesworth Tuesday, a change of venue was asked for, the attorney, John Lindt, supposing of course that it would be sent to the nearest justice, J. J. Frainey. Instead of doing so the judge sent it to the district court, which would compel the accused to lie in jail here until that court convened next month, which would enable the officers ample time to hunt up witnesses in another case, which is being treasured up against him. This novelty in the way of a change of venue, rather surprised the attorney, who had not discovered this feature of the bill creating a superior court here, and he was requested to have the motion withdrawn, as he preferred to have a speedy trial before Judge Aylesworth rather than wait for the district court. C. R. Scott, who appeared for the state, objected, but the court allowed Mr. Lindt to make a showing, and on his statement that had asked for a change under a misapprehension of the result, the judge allowed him to withdraw the motion and prepare for trial. This peculiarity in changes of venue from the superior court applies only to cases in which it has final jurisdiction. It will result in making charges very few among those who are still able to give bail, and who will have to tarry in jail until the next term of the district court, but it will doubtless be taken advantage of by some who can give bail, and who wish to make delay with the hope of witnesses disappearing. It is a feature of the superior court that was not discovered until this case came up.
