Overhauling Hull. The United States grand jury reconvenes to-day for the purpose of investigating the case of D. G. Hull, late custodian of the government building at Lincoln, who is charged with crookedness in his accounts and having obtained, by false vouchers, more money from the svernment than he should have done. It is claimed by those who appear to be well posted in the matter that he thus obtained between \$5,000 and \$6,000, and that he will be probably indicted on a large number of counts.
