The King of Counterfeiters Expires in

Colonel Louis J. Sherman, the noted counterfeiter, is dead. He was quietly buried on Wednesday from the undertaking establishment of J. V. Middleton, in Camden, by his brother and a few former friends. His death and a few former friends. His death occurred on Tuesday in the Eastern Penitentiary of Pennsylvania, and was caused by a hemorrhage of the lungs. Very few, if any, persons outside the prison were aware of it, and the burial was kept as quiet as

Sherman was probably one of the most remarkable men in his particular line of crime ever known in America. He came of good old German stock, and his mother being unable to prop-erly attend to the education of her four sons, they were all placed in the care of a Mrs. Van Court, the wife of a once well known Presbyterian minister, who did her best to bring the boys up properly and to instil into their minds the rigid doctrines of old school Presbyterianism. After the mother's death Louis was apprenticed to the tailoring business, but being of a restless, adventurous disposition the close confinement of the shop was irksome, and he was constantly devising schemes to make money and see the world. He went into the army after arriving at manhood and was noted as a brave and fearless soldier, and was entrusted with numerous secret missions requiring great skill and cool daring.

The gang had a short but prosperous career, their principal business being the "boodle" game.
