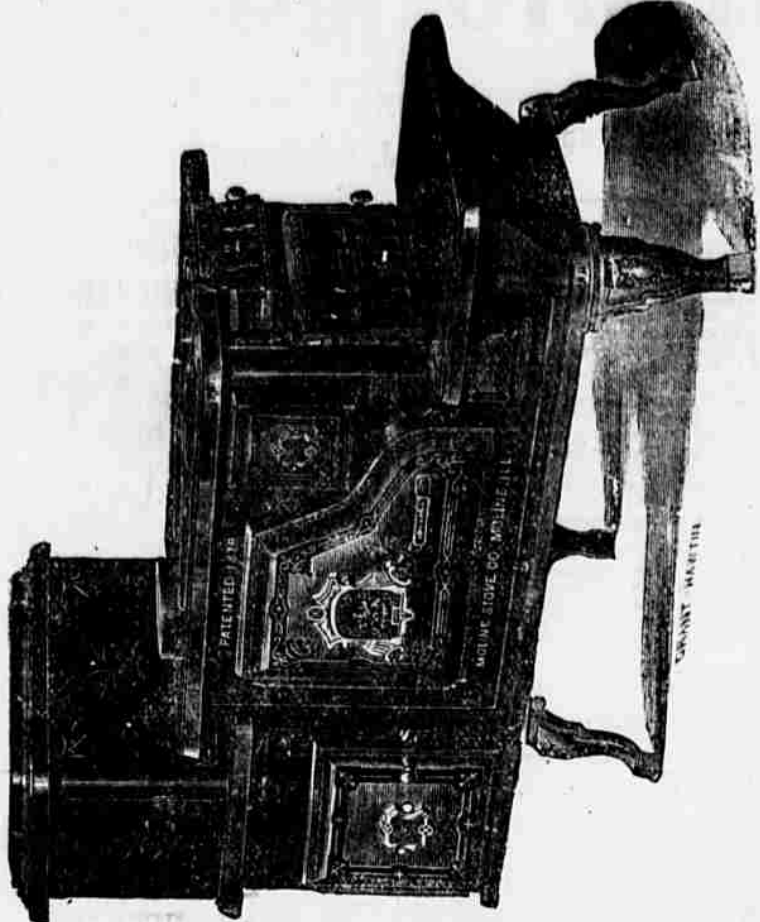

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CHRISTENING A MIDGET.

A Ten-Ounce Boy Who Was Baptized as George Henry Fromm.

New York Sun. George Fromm's boy was baptized by the Rev. Mr. Adams in the Episcopal church, Lawrence street, Manhattanville, at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The boy weighed two ounces at the time of his birth, two weeks ago, and has not gained anything to speak of since. A great many friends and neighbors of the family called at the house of Mr. Fromm, No. 87 Lawrence street, in the course of the day, but only a few were present at the christening. The child behaved remarkably well, not only in the church, but at his home, where each visitor was permitted to hold him for a brief period. His principal exhibition of feeling consisted in gasping, in which he indulged at short intervals, displaying on each occasion two exceedingly trivial teeth, whose existence, the parents say, is to be dated from Thursday last. His robe was white and made short, so as to display his feet, which were the size of large clover leaves, and fringed with very straight, round, distinct pink toes. On the second and third fingers of his right hand he wore two rings--one of gold and one of gutta percha. These ornaments might slip easily over a knitting needle, but they would have a tight squeeze with a small quill toothpick. His rather thin light-brown hair was a good deal rumpled by the impatient turning of his head in the hands of the numerous persons who were permitted to hold him. When he was turned to face the light he frowned perceptibly, notwithstanding that he is destitute of the slightest trace of eyebrows, opened and shut his eyes with astonishing rapidity, and became puckered in the most curious manner. He paid absolutely no attention to his older brother, aged 4, who was dressed in long trousers and a swallow-tail coat, and rode a rocking-horse. His brother, who is a professional midget, retaliated by utterly ignoring him. The elder offspring of Mr. Fromm was strikingly cool and unembarrassed. He had a quaint way of banging the head of his rocking-horse with an iron utensil which he had abstracted from the kitchen, and at intervals exclaiming in a small, thin voice: "I'm the boss."

Immediately after the younger Fromm was handed to the reporter it sneezed. That would not have been remarkable if it had sneezed according to its size; but, as a matter of fact, the sneeze was of a most inordinate character. It was frightfully out of proportion to little Fromm, who recoiled in a critical manner, trembled violently throughout, and gave every indication of being about to burst. The little vessel proved sturdy, however. It gradually straightened out, smiled, moved its toes and smiled. It was a pleasure to the reporter to be able to redeliver young Fromm sound in body and limb. Anybody who has ever let a fire-cracker go off in his fingers can form some slight idea of the sensation which the explosive midget conveyed.

George Henry was the name which the Rev. Mr. Adams affixed to the remarkable child, at the request of Mr. and Mrs. Fromm.

An Ivory Famine Feared. London Engineer. It is not unlikely that ivory will soon become so scarce that its use in the shape of pianoforte keys, knife-handles, and fans will be reserved for the affluent. The rapid advances in the raising of ivory are causing some uneasiness in the market. At least quarterly sale, which closed on the 28th ult., there were only 81 tons offered--including 10 tons withdrawn from previous auctions--as against 122 tons offered in April, 1881. The falling off was mainly owing to the continued scarcity of ivory--only 1 1/2 tons--and the limited supply of west coast African--11 tons. From Zanzibar and Bombay there were 33 tons, 24 tons from Alexandria, and 9 tons from Malta. All descriptions, except for billiard-ball purposes, have gone up from £3 to £4 per hundredweight and the ivory cutters have resolved for the second time this year to raise their prices. The stores in the docks this year amount to 133 tons, compared with the 213 tons for the corresponding period of last year. Mr. W. Woodcock, Sheffield, has just had invited to him no fewer than 522 tusks, which he says, will all be cleared out in a fortnight. These tusks represent 275 elephants, and if one ivory cutter alone can get through with so many in so short a time there is some fear of the elephant being relegated to the lost species of animals.
