**UTAH PROGRESS.**  
 Great Business Activity Despite Mormon Lies to the Contrary.  
 Railroad Construction and Operations, and Other Matters.

**SALT LAKE, Utah, June 27.**  
 Utah is having an unusual season. Heretofore it has not rained between May and October, and to have a shower in June was an unheard-of thing; but during this month we have had copious rains, aggregating over two inches during the time. Crops never looked better and the ground is in such condition that an abundant harvest is assured. Another remarkable circumstance is that we have had no really warm weather as yet this summer or spring.

As to business Utah is prosperous. There has been a labored effort on the part of the Mormon press to create the impression abroad that Utah was suffering a stagnation of business this season and that this came from the passage of the Edmunds bill. We are among those who believe that legislation has had no effect whatever in business circles, and to decide this question we have taken the trouble to make inquiries of business men throughout the city, as to the condition of trade during the month of May, 1882, as compared with that of May, 1881. These inquiries were partly made in person, and partly through others, and we find that invariably merchants report increase this year over last. Some report a very large increase, while with others it has been but slight. From a close examination into this question, not only in this city, but throughout all Utah, we are satisfied that business has in no way, as a whole, been affected by the late legislation in Congress, and that there has been an increase of business in keeping with the general growth of the country.

Last year every man that could be spared from home was on some of the lines of railways in Utah, Colorado, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana working on new grades. This made money plenty, and created much business for merchants. This year most of these men are at home, and Utah is not reaping so much benefit from railroad work, and yet there is a large increase in business over last year.

The Denver & Rio Grande Western have been building their road between this city and Provo, a distance of 140 miles. The road was completed on the 15th, and is being put in shape for trains. This company have lately purchased the Utah & Pleasant Valley road, together with all their coal lands. This road runs from Provo eastward sixty-five miles, making their present road 110 miles in length. East of that the grade is ready for the track through eastern Utah and western Colorado, to a connection with the Gunnison division of the road. This gap, which is now less than 200 miles, is to be closed by January 1, 1883, when we will have a through connection with Denver and a healthy rival of the Union Pacific.

The road goes through a country grand in magnitude and scenery, and rich in minerals and soil. The company have secured the management of the Wasatch & Jordan Valley and the Brigham Canyon roads, the two aggregating forty-three miles, and which will be important features.

The Salt Lake & Western railroad, which is a Union Pacific property, runs from Lih west, fifty-three miles to the terminus at smelters in Pottsville. The track was completed on the 24th and the western terminus will remain at the smelters until next year. The road was started to make a through line for the Union Pacific to the Pacific coast in California, but its progress west is retarded, as the company are lending all their energies to the construction of the Oregon Short Line.

The bathing season has opened and the Utah & Nevada trains go out well laden with people to Lake Point, where the bathing in brims is very fine. The Union Pacific own the railway and nearly all the ground around Lake Point, Garfield Landing and Lake Point, places close together, eighteen miles west of this city. Bathing is taken, the round trip on any and all trains for fifty cents.

Walker Opera House is a beautiful structure which has lately been thrown open to the public. It is nearly as large as the Lyceum opera house, and in many respects is much finer. Theatrical men say they know of none when present as cheerful an interior as that of the Walker. During the past week it was used for a variety of amusements by subscription for a variety of entertainment. St. Mark's church, Episcopal, followed the next evening in the form of a commencement, five young ladies and one young gentleman graduating with high honors. This was followed on the next evening by St. Mary's Academy, an institution conducted by sisters of the Holy Cross. Their exhibition was an immense success, in which 200 young ladies and little misses took part. The grand opera "The Barber of Seville" was kept up with music on four pianos played at once by eight misses. The programme was most lengthy, and quite varied, as was exhibited in strong characters the fine and superior class of instruction at this institution. The large Opera House was densely packed with people at \$1 each, and the entertainment netted about \$1,000 in aid of the Hospital of the Holy Cross, which has just completed for their use, one of the largest and best arranged hospitals in all the west. Dr. D. Banks McKenzie, the manager of the Walker Opera House, kindly admitted these schools to give their entertainments, and he generously gave for his interest in the cause of education. All the non-Mormon churches here maintain schools, and are doing a grand work in educating the young of Utah.

We are anxiously awaiting the arrival of the emancipation agent, under the Edmunds bill. The attempt of the Mormon to get Utah admitted as a state is looked upon as a great evil which will prove abortive. This week there is to be a singular

celebration of the 4th of July in this territory there are large numbers of old people above the age of 70, and the Mormons, great on getting up assemblies, have started the annual old-folks picnic business. The roads carry three old folks free. For the coming time the Utah Central has issued 500 passes and will issue one or two hundred more to get around among all. The 4th of July is to be celebrated on a grand scale in this city.

At the spring meeting of the Utah Jockey club now in progress, some good speed is being made. Last Friday, Red Bay, belonging to J. T. Gilligan, and Wildanor, belonging to Ed. Carigan, of Colorado, ran 1 1/2 miles on a stretch for \$5,000 a side. Red Bay won in 2:41. The first half mile was made in 33 1/2 miles in 1:48. Many fine animals are in attendance at the now.

D., Prof. of Gynecology and Diseases of Women and Children; E. E. Nixon, M. D., Prof. of Surgery; E. E. Buckingham, M. D., Anatomy; and G. W. Lewis, Prof. Chemistry. I bought a diploma of a physician in Louisville. I think his name was Parker. I have practiced medicine for twenty years with great success. By now the law would allow physicians to practice without being a diploma. Now gentlemen I would like to get a diploma, which I think you can give. As I cannot have this diploma filed without a copy and acknowledgment of it—that would or might cause me some trouble, without your assistance.

Now I will ask if you would send me proof that these were facts that I procured a diploma of you, A. D., 1875 at the City of St. Louis, and instead of saying in the diploma, 'say herself,' and make me out another one, I had it dated back 1870, at that was the year I was away from home. I do hope you can help me out, for a few dollars is a good deal for a poor widower to pay out without realizing anything from it. I have been in this country a good share of 24 years. Have run a hospital in Cheyenne in the year of 1867, and I am not now allowed to practice without being in danger of arrest. I have a crippled son to support as I have not the means to attend the college, and would not enable me to have any more success than I now have, as I am a Natural Practitioner. Some inquiries might be made of you and ask if I had told the truth, and I would get myself in trouble. Please do send another diploma and proofs and I will send you the one I have. A communication was forwarded to Cheyenne containing this information, which in due time will probably be laid before Mrs. Dr. Adams.
