THE FARMERS MEETING,

Iowa's Agriculturists Express Their Opinions on Various Topics.

The Condition and Prospects of Their Protective Association.

The Iowa State Protective Association, the representative organization of the agriculturists of Iowa, met in Des Moines last Thursday.

The board of directors, as chosen for the ensuing year, are as follows: M. L. Devlin, Polk; J. D. Whitman, Dallas; Andrew Haatic, Warren; L. S. Coffin, Webster; G. H. Crosby, Pottawattamie; James Wilson, Tama; J. E. Brown, Marshall; Henry Wallace, Madison; J. W. Murphy, Jasper.

The standing committee on manufacture is as follows: C. F. Clarkson, Andrew Haatic and G. H. Crosby.

It was decided best to choose a special trustee to take charge of the manufacturing interests of the association, and Mr. J. D. Whitman was appointed as such trustee.

The following resolution was offered by Hon. C. F. Clarkson: Resolved, That the Iowa State Protective Association tender their thanks to our representative in congress, Hon. John A. Kason, for his masterly inactivity in favor of the bill before congress for suppressing the frauds on this country by owners of patent rights, and the oppression of the people by consolidated capital.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: Resolved, That we are in hearty sympathy with all that has been done by the board of directors of the Farmers' Protective association to further the purposes of the association, and we most earnestly ask members of the state to stand by the association and render it all the aid in their power.

We find that the board of directors have worked hard the last year without pay, and at their own expense, and the progress warrants us in the belief that the ultimate success is sure if the farmers of the state stand by and sustain them.

After the adjournment of the meeting the board of directors re-elected the old officers: President, M. L. Devlin; vice-president, L. S. Coffin; secretary, G. H. Crosby; treasurer, J. D. Whitman.

The proceedings of the board were held with closed doors, and the important measures decided upon were not given for publication.

BALL AND BAT. The New Grounds Enclosed, the Stock Subscribed and Sport Ahead.

The Council Bluffs base ball stock company has been organized as follows: President, C. E. Dix; vice president, George C. Brown; secretary, P. J. McMahon; treasurer, F. S. Pauey; directors, J. W. Baird, G. C. Brown, W. D. Hardin, Fred. Kimball, C. C. Cook, Bert Clifton; manager, W. C. Beyan.

The capital stock has been fixed at \$500, divided into 100 shares of \$5 each, all of which has been taken.

The grounds secured near the old agricultural works have been enclosed and provisions will be made so that seats will be furnished to about seven hundred. The amphitheater will seat about five hundred, and with other seats, room for carriages, etc., there will be plenty of chances to see the games.

Next Tuesday, the 4th of July, there will be played the first game on the grounds, it being between the Council Bluffs nine and the Glenwood nine, one of the strongest in this part of the state. The game will begin at 2:30 o'clock and will prove an interesting contest surely.

WOMEN'S WRONGS. A New Departure for Nebraska. Lucie Bismarck.

At a social in Nebraska the other evening a young lady in a green alpaca dress read an essay in which the following occurs: "During the session of the woman's suffrage convention held in Hastings, woman's wrongs were denounced and her rights advocated with great vigor and acumen. But withal I was greatly disappointed.
