BELLWOOD.

A Thrifty Young Town in Butler County.

The Beauties of the Platte Valley in that Vicinity Business Notes.

Correspondence of the Bee. BELLWOOD, Neb., June 29.—Bellwood is a young city of about 200 inhabitants, and is situated in the west part of Butler county. It is situated in the valley of the Platte river, and on the Lincoln and Northwestern road, and is the growth of only two or three years. Seven or eight years ago, a grange store was located here, and the postoffice was called Platte, but the store was short-lived, and for several years it relapsed into the quietness of a prairie farm. Two or three years since, when the railroad was located here, connecting Lincoln and David City with Columbus, a village was planted on the farm of Mr. J. D. Bell, and the station was called Platte. The people, however, insisted on having the town and postoffice under one name, and succeeded in securing a change of both to Bellwood, in honor of Mr. Bell, the owner of the land.

THE PLATTE VALLEY here is a beautiful five or six miles wide, and comprises some of the finest lands of the west, and this infant city is supposed to be located in as rich and productive a soil as is found in the state. The soils are somewhat broken, but are among the good grazing lands, and taking the table land and the valley together, they are always counted on for a crop of something besides the rich prairie grass. The early settlers planted blocks of forests and belts of timber, and to-day there is quite a noticeable feature, as there are more heavy blocks forest of trees surrounding this settlement than is usually.

THE CROPS are looking as promising as they ever have. The corn being only a little backward, but having a fine healthy color, and a good stand with large ears, and even the chert bugs are said to be harmless so far.

THE GROWTH OF THE TOWN may be exhibited by referring to the constant building and the various trading interests. The large fine school house is, at present, being used for the church purposes, although two of the religious societies are talking of building respectable church buildings this season, and the Methodist church already have a good parsonage. Speltz & Kiesterman were early on the ground with a good elevator, and they do a large business in grain and live stock, and are connected with large elevators and a heavy trade in Ulysses and David City.

J. D. BELL AND CO. have, during the past year, completed one of the finest general merchandise stores in this section of the state. The store is a hundred feet long, is supplied with the latest improvements for light and ventilation, including stained glass, side lights, and is managed in three departments, dry goods clothing and groceries, each department being a store by itself. The second story is an opera hall, seventy-two feet long, which is about to receive its new seats. The style of managing this store and hall, the neatness and conveniences, as well as the complete stock of goods gives it a true metropolitan air, and is a great attraction to the city, and shows the enterprise of the business head of this firm, who seems to comprehend the true means of building up a town in some way besides investing all his money in seventy-five dollar houses, to rent at \$50 a year, and holding town lots so high that nobody will buy.

MILES WARREN, one of the stand by farmers, after an extended journey in the "Rockies and along the Pacific slope," has returned to his avial and hammer, and his blacksmith shop, which has been rented for some months. Mr. Warren has one of the finest groves in the country, and it will be remembered by the thousands who attended the reunion of the Grand Army three years ago, and passed into history and notoriety as "Camp Thomas." This event, so bright in the memory of the throngs who attended and joined in the "good times" of that occasion, is perhaps the reason why it is selected for a grand rally on the coming Fourth of July. The Columbus band and perhaps another band or two will be present, and among the speakers will be Judge Higgins, of Columbus, who has already attained something of an enviable record as a Fourth of July orator.

DR. S. L. BROWN, so well known to many Omaha people, and for many years a regular reader of THE BEE, has a large and successful practice in the "healing art," and dispenses drugs and provisions regularly from his store.

MR. J. WAGONER, who has for some time been Dr. Brown's assistant in the drug and grocery business, has just branched out for himself, and two months ago he opened a new grocery and provision store in a good new building. Mr. W. is also a young man, and full of energy, and of such enterprise and business qualities the life blood of the town is to be kept up to the growing standard.

G. W. BITTENHAVER and his "big hotel," are another very important addition to the place. Mr. D. came here this spring from Colorado, and has, among other improvements, erected a fine hotel that would be a credit to some of our larger towns and county seat, at a cost of about \$3,000, which will be open early in July. It is the intention to make this a good hotel, and supply it with all the conveniences to be found outside of the large cities, and to have a good stable in connection. The building is large and well built, and its appearance marks an important change in the growth and prosperity of the place.

shipped about five car loads per week. It is understood that these parties have secured land from Mr. J. D. Bell, and will soon put up large buildings and steam power to continue their work on a much larger scale. A good many new families are coming into this part of the county, and some eighty acre farms without much improvement have been sold for \$1,400 or \$1,600.

JOE SHERWOOD, the gentleman who station agent for some time, has been connected with the office at Bellwood, his old home, and he has dropped down here, making himself at home with the young land which will soon be on independent footing. This place will soon call for a bank and there should be a brick yard. For bricks are needed very much, and worth \$10 or \$12 here. Another factory is being planned, and the people are beginning to wake up to the fact that milk, and its product, is one of the best paying industries for the farmer, and as this is in the best grazing lands, some one will soon take hold of this subject and start a creamery, for a large quantity of cream is now shipped daily to Columbus for manufacture into butter.
