ROSS' ROLE.

Again Arrested for a Grievous Assault Upon Another Step-daughter.

The Girls Story of a Hard Tramp and a Drury Night in the Woods.

The name of Allen L. Ross has appeared quite frequently of late in connection with police affairs, his family matters and his past record having been pretty thoroughly aired in the trial of a case in which he was charged with assault.

Yesterday, however, he was again arrested and locked up, and on a more serious charge than has before been laid at his door, it being that of rape, the alleged victim being still another of the step-daughters, and this time the eldest of the three, a young lady about 20 years of age.

Her name is Anna Rockwood, and her story in effect is this. She has for some time been at work for a farmer living near Missouri Valley, and about twenty-two miles from here. Soon after his escape from jail here Ross appeared there, and brought her a note from her mother, asking her to come to this city to see her, the request being quite urgent.

She is not over intelligent in appearance and has evidently had few advantages in the world. She claims that two or three years ago, while living with her sister, her step-father, Ross, succeeded in accomplishing a like crime against her, and that she skipped out as the relatives and neighbors were for lynching him.

Webster City proposes to hold a grand shooting tournament some time this month.

Missouri Valley defeated the proposition to issue bonds for a town hall by 59 majority.

One hundred citizens of Des Moines have been sued for their poll tax and have to follow.

A Catholic church is being built at Pocahontas Center. It is to be finished September 1.

There is a case of small pox in the family of County Treasurer A. J. Betten at Orange City.

The trustees of Beloit college have let the contract for building a boarding house to cost \$27,000.

Rev. C. E. Harrington, of Concord, N. H., has accepted a call from the Congregational church at Dubuque.

Sioux county needs a new jail. The present jail is unsafe, and a guard has to be maintained day and night, which is rather expensive.

Efforts are being made to start a watch factory at Clinton. Of the \$100,000 required, \$42,000 had been subscribed on the 29th.

The Citizens' National Bank of Davenport declared a semi-annual dividend, payable July 1, of 9 per cent, and carried \$10,000 to the surplus account.

Near Tipton recently, the 6-year-old daughter of John Davis fell into a tub of hot water and was so severely scalded that she died in great agony twenty-four hours afterwards.

The contract for the erection of the new Normal school building at Cedar Falls has been let to a Chicago man for \$32,000, and the building is to be completed in August of next year.
