FOUND A FLAW.

A Hole in the License Ordinance Through Which Peddlers May Escape.

Another Hurdle in Framing the Laws of the Municipality.

Yesterday afternoon a young man named Booth was brought into the superior court, charged with violating the new ordinance covering licenses of all sorts, he having peddled clocks without paying the \$10 annual fee. Messrs. Dailey & Burke appeared as his attorneys, and entered a demurrer, setting up the fact that there was no penalty fixed in the ordinance for the failure to procure a license. This led to an examination of the ordinance as printed, and the discovery of the fact was made that there had been a bad blunder made which would necessitate the amending and re-printing of the whole or the lengthy ordinance. The ordinance, which is intended to embody all license regulations, is divided into chapters. Nowhere in the first chapter is there any penalty fixed for failing to take out a license. In the second chapter a provision is inserted for not having a license as required by the ordinance, but by some mistake the word "chapter" was inserted instead of "ordinance," so that the penalty is made to apply only to violations of chapter 2, and no penalty is afforded to such violations of chapter 1. The following is the section in chapter 2 in which the blunder occurs: Sec 18. Any person who shall violate, fail, neglect or refuse to comply with any provision, regulation or requirement of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon the conviction thereof before the superior court shall in case the defendant is prosecuted for want of a license, be fined in a sum not less than the smallest amount herein required, and in any other case where no special penalty is provided a sum not less than two dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, provided that whenever any person be brought before the superior court, charged with carrying on any business mentioned in this ordinance without having a license therefor, and such person shall after his arrest procure the license required by this chapter, and shall enter a plea of guilty to such charge, such court shall in addition to costs enter a fine against said person of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars. The section requiring peddlers to take out a license being in the first chapter, and the above penalty being made to apply only to the requirements of the second chapter, the court discharged the young clock peddler, holding that there was no penalty which applied to him. This lengthy ordinance has already been published twice, there having been found mistakes in the first publication, which were amended and the ordinance then republished. Now it needs to be amended again, and another publication will be required, which aside from the expense, will also cause a balk, as under the ruling of the court those who refuse to take out the licenses required by the first chapter, cannot be made to pay a penalty. WORDS TO WORKERS

ROSS' RACKET.

The Alleged Rapist is Given a Walk and Then Locked Up Again.

An Apparent Attempt to Keep His Step-daughter from Appearing Against Him.

Yesterday morning Allen Ross, who has been locked up in jail on a charge of outraging his step-daughter, was brought out of jail, and taken before Judge Aylesworth. It was expected that the step-daughter would not appear, but she was there in company with her sister, with whom it is said that Ross has also taken improper liberties. It was generally understood by the officers that Mrs. Ross had planned to keep the girls from testifying, and that they would be absent when wanted. Officer Edgar, however, the night previous had met the girls, and took them to the chief of police. They did not want to be locked up, and it was arranged that they should remain at Edgar's house all night. Hence he saw to it that they were on hand for the examination. Mrs. Ross, who does not seem to have been at all times so anxious as to where her girls spent their nights, was unusually concerned on this occasion, and hunted for them but in vain. When she discovered yesterday morning that they were on hand, she was quite flurried, and proposed to try the law and see whether anybody had a right to keep her girls away from her. On the case being called, the county attorney was not present, and Mr. Sears, an attorney from Leadville, who is visiting his old home here, consented to serve for the prosecution. C. D. Dailey, who appeared for the defense, demanded to know his right for thus appearing, but did not object strenuously. The prisoner demanded a change of venue, and the case was sent to Justice Frainey. As the party filed down the stairs to go there, Mrs. Ross got a chance to speak to her daughter, and improved the opportunity to warn her, as she was overheard saying the girl, "don't you swear to that."

Justice Frainey, having considerable civil business on hand, was not able to hear the case yesterday, and as Col. Dailey expected to go west to-day or to-morrow, to be gone several days, the case was set for Friday morning, the 21st. The girl who is the chief witness for the prosecution was made solemnly promise to appear at that time, and was warned by the court to abstain from holding any conversation with parties concerning the matter. Ross was then turned over to Constable Fox, who placed the come-alongs on him and marched him back to jail. It is thought by the knowing ones that during the continuance of the mistress will be spirited away, so that the bottom will fall out of the case. There is much feeling against Ross, and it is predicted that if he escapes justice this time that it will not be very pleasant for him if he continues to lounge about this city. Fred.
