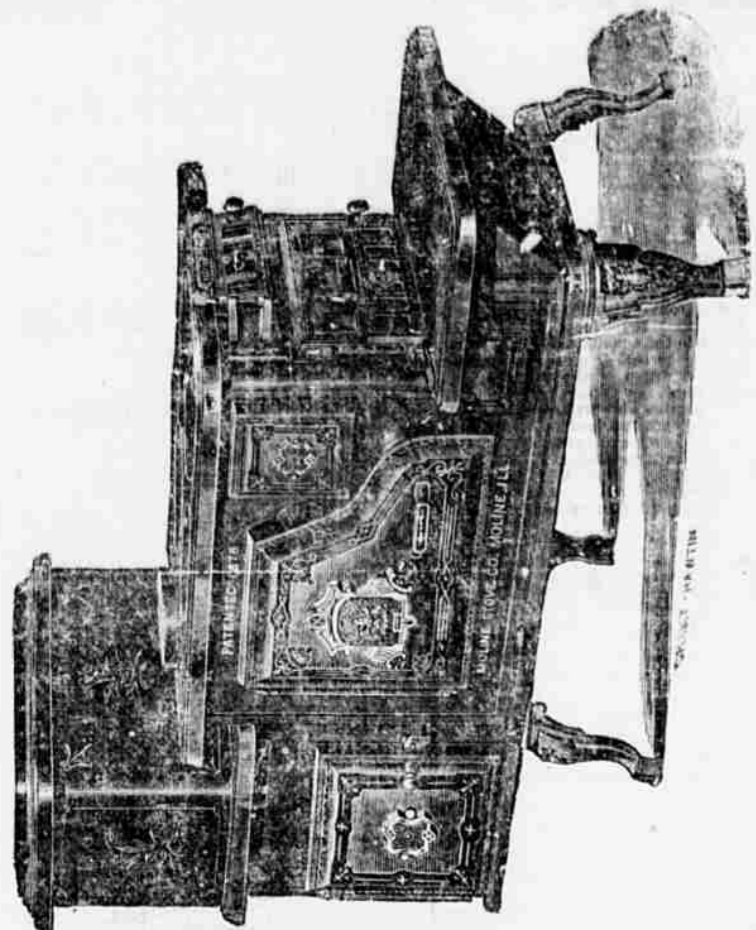

OXFORD, NEB. Advantages as a Manufacturing Town. Correspondence of The Bee. About fifteen miles east of Arapahoe, Neb., on the line of the B. & M. railroad, pleasantly located is the little town of Oxford. Its citizens have been working away in their own quiet way and the name of the town is not as widely known as some that are in reality of less importance. It is the center of a wealthy agricultural district and though the crops in the past have not been the best they are abundant this year and promise to give the town a genuine boom. New parties are coming in and engaging in business. There are grain buyers in the town who promise to buy up all the farmers can bring in. All this predicts a substantial and lasting growth. Behind this there is a power that as yet has not been felt, but is likely to break forth at any time. The Lincoln land company has bought up the most of the land in the vicinity, and a large plat has been laid out into village lots. It is evident that they intend giving the town some kind of a boom which will sell these lots, or they never would have gone to the expense of buying the land and laying them out. It is a matter of conjecture what the boom will be. Many are confident that the proposed out-crop from Hastings will strike the town, although Arapahoe expects it. One thing is certain surveys have been made into Oxford as well as Arapahoe.

Oxford possesses a great advantage in its water power which is sufficient to run very large mills. Nature seems to have intended that the power should be used as there is a natural race-way already constructed. A flour and feed mill would do well at this point. The people in the vicinity are very anxious to have a woolen mill, and they promise all encouragement to any one who would start a mill. No doubt a man understanding the business and possessed of small capital would make a good thing out of his investment to build such a mill. Wool is being produced in the valley to quite an extent and the clip is likely to be greater each year. At present the wool is shipped east and manufactured into cloth and then shipped back again. The man who buys the wool from the farmers pays a lower price for it on account of having to send it so far, this is a loss to the grower. Again the merchant charges more per yard for the cloth because it has been brought from such a distance and this comes from the consumer or the original grower of the wool. At the same time the wool can be manufactured into cloth just as well in the Republican Valley as it can be in New England. All that is necessary is for some man with enterprise to make the experiment. To insure success the beginning must be small until the people have become acquainted with the enterprise, and learn to have confidence in the Republican Valley mills. Then as the demand increases let the capacity of the mill be enlarged. "O, well!" says one, "that will do well enough to talk, but where are we to get the operatives?" The few that would be required on the start could be found any day and the number would well in proportion to the number. Build your mill and we will guarantee the necessary operations. Captain Taylor, of Hastings, has been looking around the vicinity with the idea of engaging in an extensive stock business.

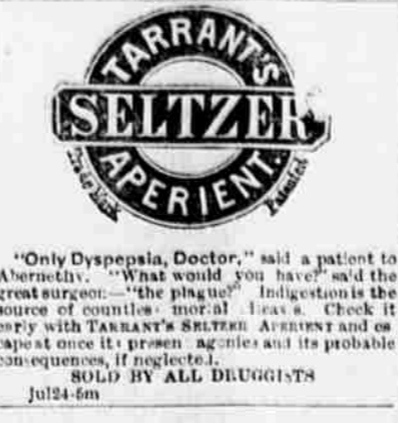

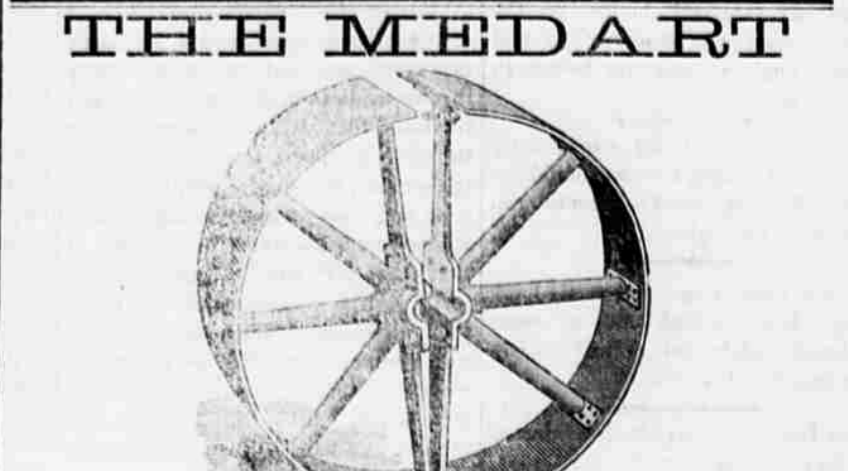
