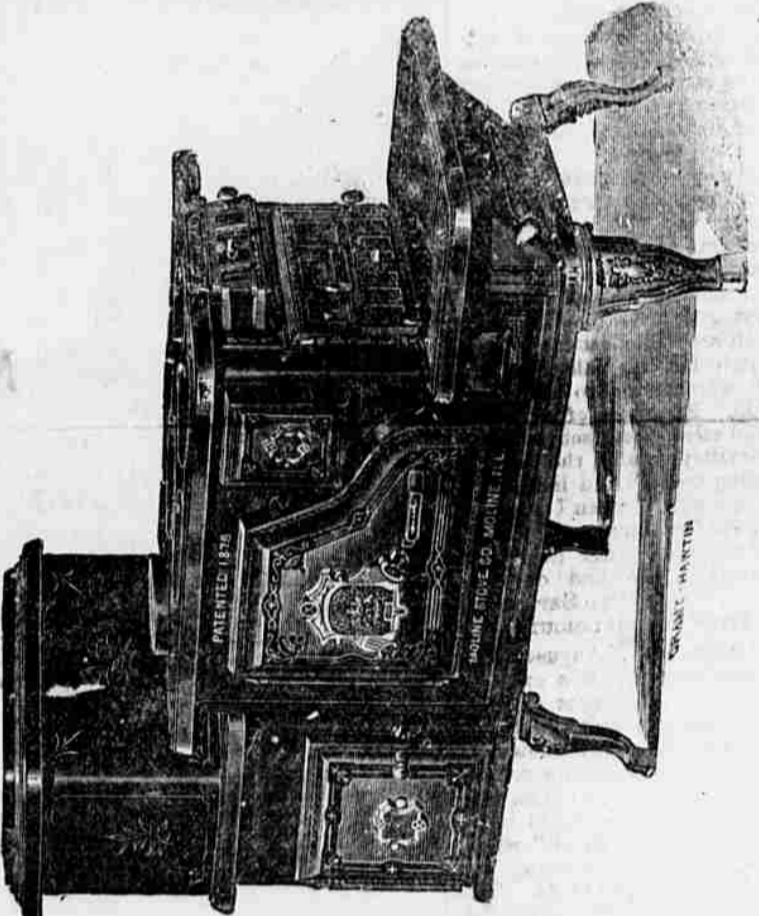

**OUT OF THE WORLD.**  
 An Omaha Outfit on Its Way to  
 Yellowstone Park.  
 Camping Out in the Mountains  
 Over Night.  
 A Royal Bill of Fare and a Good Ap-  
 petite

Special Correspondence of THE BEE.  
**BOZEMAN, MONT., August 12.**—A  
 town of 1,600 people has been during  
 the last twenty years formed the  
 nucleus of what is destined to be a  
 city at no distant day, of importance.  
 This is the proper outfitting post for  
 excursionists who visit the Yellow-  
 stone Park. The town is 110 miles  
 from Helena and 75 from the Park.  
 The Northern Pacific railroad will soon  
 have the track laid to this place, which  
 will open the popular thoroughfare of  
 the tourists. The Bozeman tunnel  
 through the mountains is 14 miles from  
 here and has been under process of  
 construction for over a year and is ex-  
 pected to be completed within six  
 months. This tunnel is 3,700 feet in  
 length and dug through the solid rock.  
 The Helena delegation of the  
 Omaha Board of Trade procured their  
 outfit here, consisting of two covered  
 spring wagons with four horses each,  
 two competent drivers and a cook,  
 who with nine passengers formed the  
 party. A stock of provisions  
 consisting of flour, meat, coffee,  
 sugar, etc., together with cooking  
 paraphernalia and extra blankets,  
 preparatory for a week's camping to  
 and through the park, was also  
 secured. Of Bozeman I am sorry to  
 state I can say but little, as our time  
 was too limited to allow me to look  
 about much. A clear idea of her re-  
 sources as a mining center, as well as  
 the location, proves to me conclusively  
 that, backed by the kind and  
 enterprising people she boasts of,  
 Bozeman is a good place for capitalists  
 to invest. Her stores are well fitted  
 with large stocks of goods and busi-  
 ness generally is booming.  
 I cannot close without calling atten-  
 tion to the stereoscopic views of the  
 National park and other mountain  
 scenery, shown me by Mr. Caffee, the  
 artist, who makes a specialty of them,  
 and Nebraska parties who will not  
 visit the park can get a much clearer  
 idea of it from views purchased from  
 him, than from the pen of any scribe.  
 The Omaha tourists leave Bozeman  
 on Saturday, August 12 at 9 p. m.,  
 for the park. I am in great hopes to  
 visit this place again in the near  
 future, when I will dwell upon her  
 merits, as she justly deserves.  
**AT CAMP TWENTY MILES OFF BOZEMAN,**  
**AUGUST 12.**  
 Reader, you would laugh to see a  
 lot of tenderfoot making preparations  
 to "hang out" over night up among  
 the Rockies. The cook at the kitchen,  
 all set to work procuring sticks and  
 stumps for a fire, bringing water and  
 staking the tent. The smoke leisurely  
 curling heavenward. Nine  
 horses turned loose on the plat-  
 form, which extends from the Yellow-  
 stone river to the high lava bluffs op-  
 posite, sprinkled with dark green  
 pines, and everybody happy as we  
 gaze at the glorious sunset behind the  
 mountain which shadows our boun-  
 teous repast, spread on the bosom of  
 mother earth with the canopy of  
 heaven for a shelter. Here we are to  
 remain all night. Supper announced,  
 all assemble with an appetite for  
 bacon and hock, that none but moun-  
 tain travelers experience.  
**THE BILL OF FARE.**  
**ENTRIES.**  
 Bacon, fried, broiled, roasted; Raised Bis-  
 cuits, hot.  
**RADISHES.**  
 Canned Peaches, Grapes, Berries.  
**DESSERT.**  
 Green Tea, Coffee, Crackers.  
 Our "China closet" contains a  
 dozen tin plates, cups, knives and  
 forks. At 6:15 having broken the  
 fast and baggage packed we start up  
 the river and view as fine scenery as  
 we can expect to see, and made to-day  
 (Sunday) about 45 miles.  
 The party consisted of F. Krag, Mr.  
 and Mrs. M. M. Marshall, J. H.  
 Erick, C. F. D. Iscull, A. Naah, J.  
 Scherb, J. Paycke, and the  
 BEE reporter, a cook and two driv-  
 ers. Along the dried and dusty  
 road we see pine, spruce, bal-  
 sam, fir, savin and sage brush.  
 Several noted peaks are seen along the  
 range with spots of snow on them,  
 most noted of them are Emigrant peak  
 which shadows Emigrant gulch—a rich  
 mining district, and  
**ELECTRIC PEAK,**  
 11,750 feet above the sea, and the  
 bald headed peak is some distance  
 above the timber range. The trip was  
 a success and we arrived at the park  
 at 11:30 a. m., Monday, August 13.  
 Some of the party fed a little sore,  
 having rode in wagons and stages some  
 265 miles along and over the rocky  
 roads with eyes strained by constantly  
 looking at the strange formation of the  
 earth. We camp at the springs for  
 dinner.

**AN ANCIENT INSTRUMENT.**  
 The Oldest Quadrant in the United  
 States.  
 THE BEE reporter was yesterday  
 shown a curiosity, in the shape of a  
 quadrant owned by Capt. Bassett, of  
 this city which is an heirloom in his  
 family, having been handed down  
 from father to son through four gen-  
 erations. As some may not know  
 what a quadrant is, it may be stated  
 briefly that it is an instrument used  
 by marines in taking the sun's atti-  
 tude to determine the time of day or  
 the locality of a vessel when it  
 has been driven out of its course  
 by a storm. This  
 quadrant was owned first by Captain  
 Bassett's great-grandfather, a sea cap-  
 tain, 160 years ago, and then by his  
 grandfather, father and himself suc-  
 cessively, all being sea captains in the

merchant service. Capt. Bassett used  
 it himself for over eighteen years in  
 the south seas. It is believed to be  
 the oldest quadrant now in existence  
 in the United States, as well as having  
 done about four times the service  
 usually exacted from instruments of  
 its kind.

 Bassett and Captain Jones propose to  
 take the exact sunrise, at noon to-  
 morrow, at M. W. Kennedy's, on  
 Thirteenth street, after the approved  
 style in vogue on the high seas.
