CUTTING THE "Q." The Union Pacific Secretly Cutting Rates on Colorado Business. Mutterings of the Coming War Growing Louder in the West.

The Pool Lines Agree on a Uniform Freight Billing. Live Stock Shippers Compelled to Pay for Loading Their Cars in Chicago.

The Colorado Pool. Special Dispatch to THE BEE. CHICAGO, Aug. 31.—Private dispatches received here to-day from Denver state that the Union Pacific is cutting rates on freight from board cities to Denver, and offering inducements to shippers in the way of passes.
