

FINANCE AND COMMERCE.

Special Dispatches to THE BEE. CONDITION OF TRADE AT NEW YORK. New York, September 1. While the extent of business transacted, as reflected by exchanges at the various clearing houses, does not show so large a volume as last year, yet it must be remembered that the speculative movement is not nearly so great as twelve months ago, while the legitimate demand for goods seems quite as large. The dry goods trade particularly active just now and the fall season may be said to be in full force. A large number of buyers are in the city from all parts of the country.

In the grain market the demand for wheat for export is a little stronger. Prices are somewhat lower, in sympathy with advances from the west, and the market closes weak. Corn is higher and closed strong on account of scarcity, except on contract trading, which is small on account of manipulation. The market for oats is weak but closes with a recovery of about 2 cents. Deliveries of later months are a shade lower. Some large option sales are reported. Petroleum has been in moderately active movement for prompt delivery at prices a shade off. Refiners generally, however, are holding firm at current prices. The export demand is moderate. Dry goods exports for the week, \$2,918,000.

FINANCIAL MONETARY.

Prime Mercantile Paper—5½ (66) per cent. Money—5½ per cent. Sterling Exchange—Bankers' bills, \$4.85; demand, \$4.89. Governments are unchanged. Share speculation opened irregular but prices in the main were a fraction below yesterday's closing. In early trade the market was very dull and prices fell off ½ cent. Delaware and Hudson and Northwestern leading the downward movement. Subsequently the tone became firmer and a recovery of ½ cent was recorded, in which Washab preferred and common, New York Central and Mutual were the most conspicuous. About midday prices receded ½ cent, the latter Washab preferred, after which the market again became strong and about 2 o'clock an advance took place, ranging from 5/8 to 3/4 per cent. St. Paul preferred sold at 128 1/8 from 127 3/4 yesterday. The final close of the general list recorded a 1/8 per cent. St. Paul preferred, after receding 1/4 cent, advanced 1/8 cent and the market closed dull and generally weak.
