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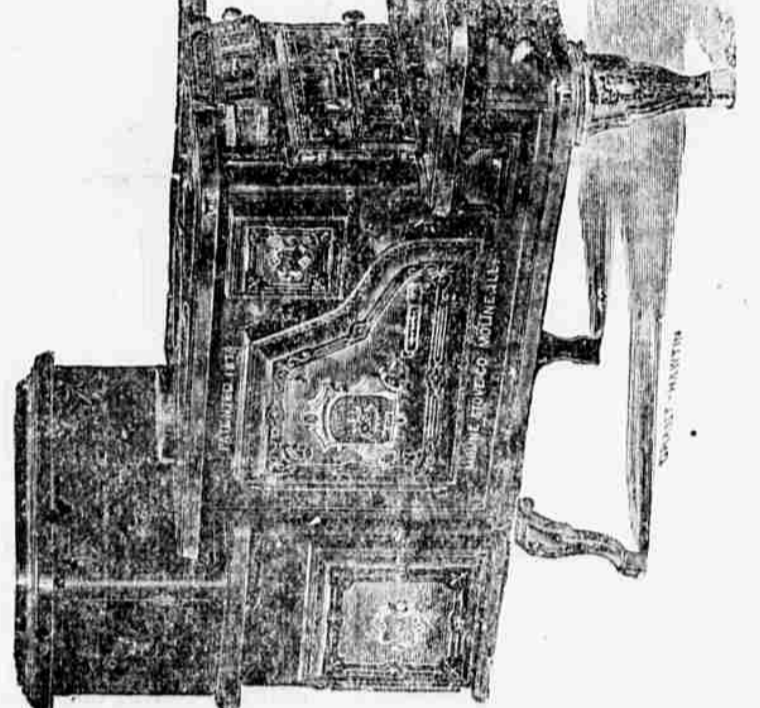
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A MILLIONAIRE'S WILL. Jesse Hoyt's Bequests.

The will of the late Jesse Hoyt, after providing for the payment of his funeral expenses, bequeaths \$50,000 to James W. Jackson, his confidential clerk, and directs that \$1,250,000 be appropriated from his estate and held in trust by his executors for the use and maintenance of his widow, Helen Maria Hoyt, during the remainder of her life. On her death \$750,000 of this amount is to be disposed of as she shall direct, and the other \$500,000 to be distributed among her nephews and nieces, children of his brothers Alfred M., Reuben, and James H. Hoyt, in equal parts. If she should die intestate the \$750,000 also goes to the same nephews and nieces. He also directs that the sum of \$1,250,000 be entrusted to his executors for the use of his daughter Mary Irene Hoyt during her life, and after her death it is to go to these same nephews and nieces. The other bequests are as follows: \$100,000 to his sister, Mary Hoyt; \$200,000 to his brother, Samuel N. Hoyt; \$100,000 to his brother, Alfred M. Hoyt; \$100,000 to his wife, of the latter; \$100,000 to his brother, Reuben Hoyt; \$100,000 to Rhoda, wife of the latter; \$25,000 to Sarah E. Hoyt, widow of his brother, James H. Hoyt; \$25,000 to Mary Nesbit Hoyt, daughter of the latter; \$500,000 to his brother, Alfred M. Hoyt, to be divided among his six children, and \$100,000 to his brother, Reuben Hoyt, to be divided among his four children. To his nephews, Jesse Hoyt, Jr., and Frank R. Hoyt, sons of Reuben, his brother, he bequeaths one-quarter of his own share of the business conducted under a certain copartnership between himself and Joseph M. Hazeltine and Edward Annan. He directs his executors to convey to the city of East Saginaw, Mich., certain lots he has there for the purpose of laying out a public park and to build a library on part of it, and he leaves \$100,000 toward the erection of the latter. All the rest of his estate he bequeaths as follows: One-fifth to his sister, Mary Hoyt; one-fifth each to his brothers, Samuel N., Alfred M., and Reuben Hoyt, and one-fifth to the daughter of his deceased brother, James H. Hoyt. He appoints William A. Webster, of East Saginaw, Mich., to look after the matter of the establishment of the public park and library.

Immigration Falling Off. Chicago News. Immigration is rapidly diminishing. At New York the arrivals for the past few weeks are greatly below those of the same period a year ago. The change is most apparent in the German tide. From Hamburg and Bremen the returns for the first six months of each year for three years have been: 1880, 75,105; 1881, 145,921; 1882, 136,375. There is an increase of 1882, it is true, over 1880, but a decrease as compared with 1881 of 9,546. The steamship companies, however, predict a revival this fall. The German tide has always been subject to singular and unaccountable fluctuations.
